Spring is here. Snow pack is less than normal but we will still experience a few days of high water from American Fork and Alpine Canyons. Operations of the flood gates at the mouth of A.F. Canyon can produce high flows into the basin with out warning. Please stay out of that portion of the creek. All ditches and streams are unsafe to be in, especially for small children. Cold water and dangerous currents always exist. It is unlawful to dispose of anything into ditches or streams. The wind seems to be our common enemy. Please help where you can.

## Water Conservation

We are currently in a drought year with limited water. Highland City is encouraging all residents to conserve water wherever possible to avoid any mandatory watering restrictions for as long as possible this irrigation season. In order to accomplish this, we are asking that you follow these voluntary guidelines to help conserve water this year:

### *What does this mean to you?*

- Mandatory limits on Watering Days according to the following schedule:
  - \* Even Numbered Street Address: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
  - \* Odd Numbered Street Address: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
  - \* No Sunday Residential Watering
- Limit of Hours: Not yet mandatory, but recommended watering between the hours of 10:00 p.m. - 6:00 a.m.
- Limits of Watering Duration: Not yet mandatory, but recommended not longer than 30 minutes per station.
- Manage Runoff: Adjust sprinklers to water lawns, flowers, and gardens. Avoid excessive flow and runoff onto sidewalks and streets.
- There are penalties in place for non-compliance (see 2013 Mayor's Proclamation).
- Applies to all residents that use the Pressurized Irrigate System.

## Burn Permits Available On-line

The open burn policy was changed in 2013 to meet the revised standards of the State Department of Air Quality (DAQ). Burn Permits will not be available at City Hall or at the Lone Peak Fire Department. Instead permits will be available free on-line.

Recent modifications to these rules change the open burn periods and includes a statewide requirement to obtain a permit from the local fire authority. The permit application process begins at the DAQ's website. Follow the link:

Burn permits may be issued on-line between March 30 and May 30 and between September 15 and October 30. Be sure to plan ahead - the entire permitting process could take 3-5 days to complete. **Please include your email address when submitting a permit so you can receive your permit promptly.**

If completing the open burn permit application online is not an option, a hard copy of the open burn permit application, contact the DAQ by phone at (801) 536-4000. Please note: it may take up to 14 days from the date of request to receive an open burn permit if a hard copy is submitted for processing. You may also use the public computers at City Hall and the Library to request a permit.

## Safety Tips from Rocky Mountain Power

Spring's warmer days are perfect for yard work, planting and playing outside. Rocky Mountain Power reminds you to be safe this season:

- Keep yourself, ladders, irrigation pipes and anything you are handling at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines.
- Call 811 at least 48 hours before you dig when building fences, installing sprinkler systems or planting trees.
- Don't prune tree limbs or remove trees near power lines, please call Rocky Mountain Power for help.
- Never sit on, play on or dig near pad-mounted transformers (green, metal boxes in neighborhoods). If you find one that has been unlocked or damaged, please call Rocky Mountain Power immediately at 1-888-221-7070.

## Now is the Time to Prepare for Spring Run-off and Plan Ahead

Springtime in the Rockies is a dynamic season that includes runoff – when melting mountain snow flows into rivers raising water levels. Spring runoff typically starts in April and peaks in June. Each spring there is a chance that warmer temperatures and higher than average snow packs will result in higher flows and rising water levels along streams and rivers. Sudden, prolonged warm spells combined with heavy rains increase the chances of localized flooding. This can generally be forecasted using information on snow pack, predicted weather and knowledge of stream channel capacities. These forecasts generally create a foundation for an enhanced level of readiness. It is ultimately every citizen's responsibility to protect their own private property and to consider how risks on his or her property affect neighbors up and downstream. The Lone Peak Fire District

encourages residents to reach out to their neighbors and work together to address potential problems.

- Some actions private property owners can take to protect property are:
  - Remove debris (sediment) from the ditches to increase channel capacity.
  - Protect buildings by purchasing and keeping sandbags on hand.
  - Stabilize banks at risk for erosion such as those undercut and unstable.

During runoff, residents and guests should stay a safe distance from stream and river banks, which in some areas have eroded and are less stable. Report any overflow of rivers or streams. If significant property damage is imminent or if the conditions present a life safety hazard, call 911.

## Lone Peak Fire Department Raising Funds for Emergency Phone



When Brigham Young University student Ashleigh Cox was swept into a creek at Tibble Fork by a February avalanche, bystanders couldn't dial 911 until they drove to the mouth of American Fork Canyon, 15 minutes away. By then, it was too late.

In Cox's memory, Lone Peak emergency response firefighters have set up an account for donations to fund the installation of a emergency telephone at the popular recreation area. The Lone Peak Fire District Emergency Phone Fund has been established at the Bank of American Fork, and donations can be made at any branch. The account number is 3262201. ## City Streets getting crack sealed

This spring City crews will start crack sealing streets to prevent water from seeping into the cracks and causing deterioration and road base erosion.

Before crews can seal the cracks, they clean them with high pressure air; a process that scatters rocks and dirt in the street. After the sealant has been placed and has cured, a street sweeper will clean the debris from the street.

Please support these efforts by not parking on the street when you see crack sealing is occurring on your street. Crack sealing will take place spring through fall (weather permitting). If you have questions, call Public Works at (801) 772-4523.
