### Roads – A 1000 Mile Journey

There is a saying that a 1000 mile journey begins with a single step. Fixing Highland's 80 miles of roads also begins with a single step. How extensive is this road project? It's a project that's estimated to cost approximately \$25 million in today's dollars. Highland City needs a plan, but where do we start?

First step: Assess the existing road conditions. The 80 miles of roads in Highland have been given a letter grade from A to F; A being essentially brand new and F being complete alligator-cracking with suspected moisture weakening of the base. This road assessment has been completed for several years.

Second step: Prioritize. Should we rebuild the roads in the worst condition first or work on the roads that give the biggest bang for our buck? The City staff and Council have decided to work primarily on the most cost efficient road projects by treating A-C grade roads with relatively inexpensive surface treatments to restore conditions. Ideally, every road within the City would be treated every five years. The City staff submitted a 5 year plan for all A-C grade roads to the Council and some of the recommended surface treatments are already contracted for work this upcoming spring.

Third step: Budget for the 5 Year Maintenance Plan. It would cost approximately \$1 million to provide a surface treatment for all A-C grade roads in Highland on a five year rotation. The City Council has allocated \$516,000 in the 2014-2015 budget year for road maintenance, which is clearly not adequate to maintain all of Highland's A-C grade roads.

Fourth step: Create a plan and budget for the D and F roads. The City staff and Council will pick up the discussion on this topic soon. These roads will continue to deteriorate until the Council and citizens determine the next steps for this project.

We as a City have already taken some important steps towards restoring Highland's roads, but there is still a long way to go. Our efforts this year will be to continue to implement the 5 Year Road Maintenance Plan and find additional sources of funding. This year we need to determine what we can do to reconstruct the D and F roads. Citizen feedback is heartily encouraged and will be much appreciated in our journey to fix the roads in Highland.

**We will be kicking off the season February 23-28 with the play *Standing, Still Standing*.** This play by local award-winning playwright Melissa Leilani Larson is a contemporary, humorous love story that moves between the waking world, the

online community, and dreams. Standing Still Standing shows the strains chronic fatigue syndrome can put on a man's life and marriage. This is a comedy about love and life — and staying awake for both. Winner of the 2002 Vera Hinckley Mayhew award, and of an Honorable Mention in Drama from the Association for Mormon Letters. Mel's 2006 screen adaptation won the LDS Film Festival Screenwriting Contest. We are pleased to announce that Standing Still Standing will be directed by Adam Cannon. Auditions for Standing Still Standing will be the first week in January. More information to come.

In March, Highland Youth Shakespeare will present, ***The Merchant of Venice***. A play by William Shakespeare, believed to have been written between 1596 and 1598. Though classified as a comedy in the First Folio and sharing certain aspects with Shakespeare's other romantic comedies, the play is perhaps most remembered for its dramatic scenes, and is best known for Shylock and the famous "Hath Not a Jew eyes?" speech. The Merchant of Venice is being directed by Ellen Burns who directed The Tempest in Highland last year.

In April, Highland kicks off a new partnership with the Cedar Hills Arts Council with a youth production of ***Annie Jr.*** This classic story is brought to life on stage through the eyes of children. Annie will be directed by Jordan Long, director of Catholic School Girls.

In June, Highland will co-produce with Cedar Hills the musical ***Honk!*** Written by the team that brought us Mary Poppins, Honk is a comedic and touching look at Hans Christian Anderson's tale, The Ugly Duckling. This Olivier winning Best Musical has roles to include the entire family and will be performed at the Heritage Park Amphitheater in Cedar Hills. We are pleased to announce that Gabriel Spencer, director of the wildly popular production The Diary of Anne Frank last season, will be directing Honk!

The season will end with the classic, Pulitzer prize winning play, ***Dancing at Lughnasa***. Dancing is set in Ireland's County Donegal in August 1936, around the festival of Lughnasa, the Celtic harvest festival, in the fictional town of Ballybeg. It is a Memory play told from the point of view of the adult Michael Evans, the narrator. He recounts the summer in his aunts' cottage when he was seven years old. The play depicts the late summer days when love briefly seems possible for three of the Mundy sisters (Chris, Rose, and Kate) and the family welcomes home the frail elder brother, who has returned from a life as a missionary in Africa. However, as the summer ends, the family foresees the sadness and economic privations under which they will suffer as all hopes fade. The play takes place in early August, around the festival of Lughnasadh, the Celtic harvest festival.

Season tickets will include all 4 shows (Merchant of Venice is free admission) and will cost only \$23.50 for adults, and \$21.50 for children, students, and seniors. ## Winter Snow Removal & Plowing

During the winter months it is important for Highland residents and the City to work together during snow removal weather. During heavy snow storms it can take as much as 48 hours to clear all priority routes and through streets once the storm has subsided. Parking on the street and objects in the road (trailers, basketball standards, etc.) makes it difficult for plows to clear the streets. Vehicles may not park on City Streets between 12:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m., December 1st through March 31st, and anytime snow is present. The Police Department may issue a parking citation.

Many people use 4 wheelers to plow their drive ways and sidewalks; the Police Department reminds you that 4 wheelers are not allowed on the street unless they are street legal.
