2015 Municipal Election Opportunity

This is the year for Municipal Elections. Highland City will have 3 City Council seats open in this election. Each seat is for a 4-year term. The November Election will be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2015.

Please consider serving your community by running for office for one of these positions. Qualifications to hold a Municipal Office are:

1. Be a US Citizen at the time of filing
2. Be a registered voter of the municipality
3. Be a resident of the municipality for a period of 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election. (UCA 10-3-301; 20A-9-201; 20A-9-203)

- Candidate filing period begins: June 1, 2015
- Candidate filing deadline ends: June 8, 2015 (20A-9-203)

Declaration of Candidacy Forms or Nomination Petitions must be filed in person with the City Recorder at 5400 West Civic Center Dr. Highland, Utah between the hours of 8:00 am and 6:00 pm Monday-Thursday and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm on Friday. Recreation Programs

Highland City participates with [Cedar Hills City Recreation](#). All youth sports and recreation programs are available with no additional non-resident fees. Please contact Cedar Hills Recreation at recreation@cedarhills.org or call: 801-785-9668, ext. 302.

Co-ed Teen Soccer: Come join the Cedar Hills Co-ed Teen Soccer League for high school students, grades 10 through 12. Form your own teams and enter your team name when you register. There will be eight players on the field with four girls and four boys. Register until March 15 at cedarhills.org/recreation. Games will begin in April and will be played on Monday afternoons in Cedar Hills and American Fork.

Tot Soccer Is Back with the Spring Session! Cedar Hills Tot Soccer is a fun, six-week soccer league for children ages three and four. Games are played on Tuesday evenings, starting April 21. Parents are encouraged to coach, if possible. Online registration begins March 1 at: cedarhills.org/recreation and continues through April 9. The registration fee is \$25 plus a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible T-shirt, which can be worn for any Cedar Hills youth sport program.

Karate Classes: A new session of karate classes begins March 30. The one-hour classes are held Monday and Wednesday evenings for children ages 6-12 at the Cedar Hills Recreation Center. The beginner-level class (white belt only) is at 4:00, the level-two class (yellow to senior orange belt) is at 5:00, and the level-three class (blue to senior blue belt) is at 6:00. The registration fee is \$50 for each five-week session.

T-Ball for Boys and Girls Ages 4 & 5: Cedar Hills offers T-Ball for boys and girls, ages four and five. Each child bats every inning and plays in the outfield. Games are played twice a week, beginning the last week of May through the end of June. Register at: cedarhills.org/recreation until May 4, or until the teams are full. The cost per child is \$25, plus a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible T-shirt, which can be worn for other Cedar Hills youth sport programs.

Curbside Recycling Tips

The Facts about Aluminum. Aluminum cans are one of the most used items in the United States. They are also one of the easiest items to recycle. Check out these facts about aluminum, and make sure to put your empty aluminum cans in your blue bin. Remember there is no need to rinse out your soda cans—just toss them into your recycle bin.



- Americans throw away enough aluminum to rebuild the entire commercial air fleet every three months!
- If an aluminum can is not recycled it will take up to 500 years to fully degrade in a landfill.
- Recycled aluminum can be returned to store shelves in as little as sixty days!

Pressurized Irrigation

The pressurized irrigation system will be back on and ready for use the week of **April 15th**. Please be patient while the City brings up the system. It usually takes a week to ten days to bring online. Make sure your stop and waste valves are **shut off** while the system is being loaded. Individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

Burn Permits Available On-line

The open burn policy was changed in 2013 to meet the revised standards of the State Department of Air Quality (DAQ). Burn Permits will not be available at City Hall or at the Lone Peak Fire Department. Recent modifications to these rules change the open burn periods and includes a statewide requirement to obtain a permit from the local fire authority. The permit application process begins at the DAQ's website. Follow the link: <http://www.airquality.utah.gov/Compliance/OpenBurning/index.htm>

Burn permits may be issued on-line between March 30 and May 30 and between September 15 and October 30. Be sure to plan ahead - the entire permitting process could take 3-5 days to complete. **Please include your email address when submitting a permit so you can receive your permit promptly.**

If completing the open burn permit application online is not an option, a hard copy of the open burn permit application, contact the DAQ by phone at (801) 536-4000.

Please note: it may take up to 14 days from the date of request to receive an open burn permit if a hard copy is submitted for processing. You may also use the public computers at City Hall and the Library to request a permit.


