NOTICE OF FIREWORKS RESTRICTIONS & OPEN FIRE BAN

By Executive Order of Mayor Thompson, due to environmental issues (weather conditions, dry fuel loads, and extremely escalating fire conditions), topographical considerations (mountainous terrain, brush covered areas throughout the city), and public safety concerns (people, structures and property), Fireworks Restrictions and Open Fires Bans have been ordered effective July 1, 2015.

The ignition and discharge of ALL fireworks is prohibited within the City of Highland in the following areas: (a map is available at www.highlandcity.org, at City Hall, Fire Station, and Police Station).

Open fire, camp fires, and the igniting and burning in fire pits are prohibited except in landscaped yards in private residence with a hose or fire extinguisher nearby. Small portable screened fire enclosures and gas barbecues are permitted at private residences. Smoking is not permitted in city parks, campgrounds, open space or vacant lots. Discharge any smoking material, matches or other ignition sources from a vehicle is prohibited.

This order is enforceable by law and a violation of which carries penalties and provisions as outlined in the Utah State Law.

Therefore by Executive Order of the Mayor and Highland City, this order supersedes all other orders. The Mayor may deem this order to be modified and / or cancelled depending on the current fire conditions.

OUTDOOR WATER CONSERVATION

The City's primary water sources for the PI system are the American Fork River and Deer Creek Reservoir. These sources of water will be limited as we are entering a **very low water year due to the inadequate snowfall** this past winter. Highland City is encouraging water conservation efforts to allow sufficient water throughout the spring and summer to all residents. It is necessary for all residents to conserve water wherever possible to avoid any mandatory watering restrictions. In order to accomplish this, we are asking that you **follow the voluntary guidelines** that are posted online at www.highlandcity.org to help conserve water.

Watering Days according to the following schedule:

- Even Numbered Street Address: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
- Odd Numbered Street Address: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
- No Sunday Residential Watering, allowing the storage facilities to fill.

Through proper utilization and conservation of our precious water resources we are hopeful that our residents **will have sufficient water through the year** for outdoor watering. For questions, please contact the City Offices at 801-756-5751.

mosphere and hard-working, volunteer service-oriented people they found here. It turned out to be a great place to raise their five sons and two daughters. Glen's volunteer service and commitment to Highland began almost immediately. He served on the first Highland Citizens Transportation & Circulation Advisory Subcommittee, and was asked to serve as its chair. As a consultant with the City's Engineer, Glen wrote the original Highland City Transportation Master Plan. Glen served as a member of the Highland City Council from 1992-1996. He was primarily responsible for bringing pressurized irrigation to Highland. He was also heavily involved in writing the ordinance facilitating controlled commercial development in the city as well as many other policies, programs and projects important to the economy and quality-of-life of our young and rapidly growing community. While on the City Council, he served as Mayor Pro Tem for two years.

In his personal life, Glen has consistently demonstrated integrity and service. He taught and conducted research in the BYU Civil Engineering Department for 38 years before retiring in 2005. During that time, he arranged for volunteer BYU Civil Engineering students to build the gazebo located in the Merlin B Larson Park in Highland as a community service project. Most importantly, Glen has been a great example of volunteer service to his children who are now caring, responsible adults of good character. They have great memories of growing up in Highland.
