## OUTDOOR WATER CONSERVATION

It is necessary for all residents to conserve water wherever possible to avoid any mandatory watering restrictions. In order to accomplish this, we are asking that you **follow the voluntary guidelines** that are posted online at [www.highlandcity.org](http://www.highlandcity.org) to help conserve water.

**Watering Days according to the following schedule:**

- Even Numbered Street Address: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
- Odd Numbered Street Address: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
- No Sunday Residential Watering, allowing the storage facilities to fill.

Through proper utilization and conservation of our precious water resources we are hopeful that our residents **will have sufficient water through the year** for outdoor watering.

## “Stepping On Class” focuses on reducing falls

“Stepping On” is a 7 week workshop that builds strength, balance and confidence in an effort to reduce the number of falls for a person 60 and older. Among older adults falls are the leading cause of injury, hospital admissions, and death. More than 1/3 of seniors experience a fall each year. Stepping On is an evidence based program that helps seniors become more aware of fall hazards and to learn how to reduce their fall risk. The Utah County Health Department will present a workshop on Wednesdays starting September 9th and running through Oct 21st from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Utah County Health Department (151 S. University Ave Provo). Classes are free, but reservations are required (space and materials are limited). To register, please call 801-851-7095. ## School Bus Safety Tips from the Lone Peak Fire Department

Taking the bus for the first time is a big step for your child. Help your kids get a gold star in bus safety by following these tips.

### THE HARD FACTS

School buses are the safest mode of motorized transportation for getting children to and from school, but injuries can occur if kids are not careful and aware when getting on and off the bus.

### TOP TIPS

- Walk with your kids to the bus stop and wait with them until it arrives. Tell kids to stand at least three giant steps back from the curb as the bus approaches and board the bus one at a time.
- Teach kids to wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before getting off and never to walk behind the bus.
- If your child needs to cross the street after exiting the bus, he or she should take five giant steps in front of the bus, make eye contact with the bus driver and cross when the driver indicates it's safe. Teach kids to look left, right and left again before crossing the street.
- Instruct younger kids to use handrails when boarding or exiting the bus. Be careful of straps or drawstrings that could get caught in the door. If your children drop something, they should tell the bus driver and make sure the bus driver is able to see them before they pick it up.
- Drivers should always follow the speed limit and slow down in school zones and near bus stops. Remember to stay alert and look for kids who may be trying to get to or from the school bus.
- Slow down and stop if you're driving near a school bus that is flashing yellow or red lights. This means the bus is either preparing to stop (yellow) or already stopped (red), and children are getting on or off.
