Highland Historical Society Established

A city as unique as Highland deserves to have its story recorded. That was the thought behind City Councilmember Jessie Schoenfeld's desire for the city to have its own historical society. "I know what good comes from historical societies in cities" Jessie stated. In June, the idea to form the society became reality.

Charlie Greenland was elected president at the society's first meeting. Greenland shares Schoenfeld's vision. "Ordinarily, cities in Utah were settled when Brigham Young sent groups out across the state, but Highland was not built that way. It was brought together by the people who wanted to live here," he said. "The culture and ideas that brought Highland together are quite unique." The initial mission statement of the society is, "To preserve and [share] the past of Highland City for a better present and future." As their first project, Greenland, Schoenfeld and other historical society members are working to put together a comprehensive written history of the city. In addition to the written history, the historical society is planning a small museum in the Highland Community Center, 5378 West 10400 North. The museum will display a collection of historical artifacts, for example, household items and small tools.

The historical society meets the second Wednesday of each month at Highland City Hall, at 7:00 p.m. The meetings are always open to the public. Highland Historical Society

The Highland Historical Society will feature articles each month to highlight individuals in Highland who have made an impact to the community. This month's article, written by Dave Larsen, highlights the Highland Disposal Company which was first organized by Don Bringhurst.

"I met Don Bringhurst in 1966 playing in a church softball league. We played for many years together. Don was an entrepreneur, always trying new things. At one point he was selling toilet paper oil filters. Don was also a WWII Veteran. He flew B-24's in the South Pacific during the war. He was a modest man and I didn't learn this until his passing in 2006. He and his wife Dora, who passed away August 2015, were contributors to Highland's early years.

Around 1980 Don saw the need for Highland City residents to have curbside garbage service and bought an old Ford, 2 man garbage truck. Prior to this, residents hauled their own garbage

to the garbage dump. Don was 60 years old at the time and couldn't afford a 2nd man, so he did the work himself. He would get out of the truck and run the trash compactor at each house. He covered all of Highland with one truck. He was a very pleasant man. Sometimes if the garbage wasn't at the street, he would go in to the garage to get it. It was a shoe-string operation and I worked on his garbage truck in my driveway. His knees eventually gave out and he ended up selling the business to Vic Scarpino and his wife, Sharon. I continued working on their trucks as they purchased another one without an engine. We found a broken down truck in the swamps in Lehi and I laid underneath it to remove the engine. I brought the engine home and installed it in the purchased truck. In 1985, Vic bought a new garbage truck



that allowed him to pick up all of Highland in one day instead of three. Later that year they sold the business to Laid Law."
