UTILITY RATE INCREASE

Did you notice that your utility bill went up? On Tuesday, June 14 the City Council approved a rate increase for the Pressurized Irrigation and Storm Drain systems beginning for the July 2016 bill. Culinary Water and Sewer rates remained unchanged. The table below shows what the rate increases means for you.

Lot Size (acres)	Monthly Rate Increase
0.33	\$12.60
0.5	\$14.47
0.75	\$17.24
1.0	\$20.00

With this increase in rate, please be sure to pay close attention when paying your bill. If you are on direct pay with your bank or have set a limit through Xpress Bill Pay, you may need to make some adjustments.

City Council Brief

June 7

A developer presented to the City Council on the idea of purchasing property from the City located east of the police station for the development of a mixed use senior living facility. City Council will consider surplussing the aforementioned property at the July 19 City Council meeting.

City Council approved the Final Plat of a two lot subdivision located at 9916 North 6800 West. The developer is now working with the City to get their civil plans approved before starting the building process.

City Council amended the development code to allow car washes in the Commercial Residential zone. Quick Quack car wash now intends to proceed in the development process to build a car wash at 5452 West 1100 North.

Some concern has been raised by City Council related to the budget and service level of Lone Peak Public Safety District. As such, City Council approved a motion to study additional options for Police and Fire Services. If Highland did choose to leave Lone Peak Public Safety District, a two year notice would need to be given prior to withdrawal.

June 14

City Council passed both the Fiscal Year 2017 certified tax rate and budget. The budget can be viewed online at www.highlandcity.org. One of the big changes is an added \$144,500 to road maintenance budget.

2016 Water Conservation

Highland City has set watering guidelines to encouraging water conservation efforts to allow sufficient water throughout the spring and summer to all residents. Typically, our community uses 50% more water than necessary to water our yards.

These guidelines are meant to not only help us conserve water but also to help with the functionality of the PI system city-wide.

Watering Schedule:

- Even Numbered Street Address: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
- Odd Numbered Street Address: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
- No Sunday Residential Watering, allowing the storage facilities to fill.
- Recommended watering hours from 6:00 p.m. - 10:00 a.m.

Boyd was an appointed member of the first Highland City Council when Highland City was incorporated in 1977. He also served on the Highland City Planning Commission and the Highland Water Company Board of Directors, and was the Highland City Engineer for many years. Highland City is grateful for all the service Boyd gave to the City over the years. Funeral services were held Saturday, June 25 in Highland, Utah and Boyd was interred in the Highland City Cemetery.

How I Remember Highland as I Grew Up There by Sylvan B Buhler

I was born at home rather than in a hospital as most babies were back in 1936, with the doctor coming to our rural home in Highland. I was also born to a large family being the tenth of eleven children in the Alma and Hazel Buhler family. We lived on a farm in a small wood frame home of approximately 800 square feet. You will notice that through the years houses keep getting larger while families keep getting smaller.
