## City Council Brief

### October 4

Mid-Year Budget Adjustments for FY2017 passed. A majority of these budget adjustments were the new revenue and expenses adopted as a part of the Utility Rate Study. Projects to be included in this fiscal year include: Replacing the filters at the pressurized irrigation station, installing grinder pumps at a lift station, providing a dedicated generator to the a culinary water booster station and an upgrade in a sewer line in the central location of the city.

A developer requested to rezone 5.76 acres of property in Town Center to Planned Development in order to build age restricted housing units and commercial space. The rezone request was denied.

A resident approached City Council about brining back Open Space Maintenance Agreements. Open Space Maintenance Agreements are contracts between a resident whose property abuts unimproved open space and Highland City that allows for the resident to maintain the open space. Council directed staff to research the issue for a discussion on the next meetings agenda.

### October 18

The Council discussed a resolution to enter into a Interlocal Agreement with the North Utah County Aquifer Council. This Council is made of representatives of Pleasant Grove City, American Fork City, Highland City, Alpine City, Lehi City, and Saratoga Springs City and the Central Utah Water Conservancy District. The purpose of the Council is to facilitate and coordinate aquifer recharge and storage within north Utah County, while minimizing the negative impacts of excessive groundwater withdrawals by the Members from the common aquifers as development occurs.

Council and staff held a discussion on Open Space Maintenance Agreements (see proceeding paragraph). This issue is slated to come back on the November 1 meeting.

## Youth Council Applications

The 2017 Youth City Council applications are now available. The Highland Youth City Council is a great opportunity for leadership, community involvement, service, and learning. Council members must live in Highland City and be in grades 9 – 11. Some of the activities include: USU Leadership Retreat, Easter Egg Hunt, Arbor Day Tree Planting, Highland Open House, Highland Fling, Senior Citizens Dinner, and Christmas Crafts Day. ### Strasburgs

The Strasburgs were a hard-working, farming family who lived in Highland, Utah. We grew and sold corn (sold as a baker's dozen), wheat, oats, peas, tomatoes, peaches, pears, apples, apricots, cherries, plums, raspberries, currants, gooseberries, and watermelons. Each of these great big seeded watermelons was wonderful and cost 10 cents. People traveled for miles to buy our watermelons.

Our family had the right priorities: Faith in God, having enough food to eat, keeping warm, helping others, and working together as a team.
