November 1

The Final Plat for Skye Ridge Estates, an R-1-30, 28 lot single family subdivision located at 9725 North 6800 West was approved. The developer is now working with the City to get their civil plans approved before starting the building process.

The Site and Architectural Plans for Quick Quack Car Wash were approved. The car wash will be located west of Martinizing Dry Cleaning on S.R. 92. The developer is now. The developer is now working with the City to get their building and civil plans approved before starting construction.

The Site Plan was approved for a fast food restaurant. The building will be west of the Wendy's and north of Meier's along S.R. 92. The tenant has not yet been finalized. The developer is now working with the City to get their building and civil plans approved before starting construction.

November 15

A rezone from R-1-40 to R-1-30 of 28.38 acres of property located at 6475 West 11800 North was approved with the stipulation that the subdivision comply substantially with the concept plan. To learn more about zoning districts see <http://bit.ly/HC-zoning>. A referendum on this decision has been filed with the City. This means that the City Council decision has been stayed. The petitioners now have 45 days from Monday, November 28 to gather the required number of signatures to place this item on the ballot in November 2017.

Council approved obtaining bids on replacing the 10" sewer pipe along 10400 North with a 12" line. This replacement would run from approximately 6600 West to Alpine Highway and along 5600 West from 10400 North to approximately 10550 North. The replacement will provide new asphalt along the roads as well as a better pedestrian walkway. This project would not begin until the school year ends and would be completed before the 2017 Fling. When the bids are obtained, they will be brought back to City Council for final approval.

Let it Snow, Let it Snow, Let it Snow

While the weather outside may not be frightful today, snow and winter temperatures will surely be here soon. The safety of our Highland City residents during and after a snow event is a major concern. Our Public Works department utilizes all available assets as needed to clear the roads depending on the storm event, snowfall received, and duration of the storm. Salt and sand are used only to provide traction at intersections as well as other problematic locations as needed.

Snow Plowing Priority

Please see the inserted map for snow plowing priority. Street plowing priority is based on the road classification and usage intensity. Streets identified as arterial or collector roads, deemed to be in the minimum network needed to provide basic transportation for public safety, schools or steep grades will receive priority. These streets will be plowed 24 hours per day, 7 days a week when weather conditions warrant. When storm conditions have moderated, roads interior to subdivisions, including cul-de-sacs will be plowed. It may take anywhere from 3 to 5 days after the storm before crews are able to clear all of these areas.

There are three traffic corridors within Highland that fall under the jurisdiction of the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT). These roads are SR-92 (Timpanogos Highway/Canyon Road), SR-74 (Alpine Highway), and SR-129 (North County Boulevard). Questions and concerns regarding these roads are referred to the UDOT Region 3 offices at 801-227-8000.

Street Parking

Street parking is prohibited from December 1 to March 31 between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. and any time snow is present to allow access to the plows for snow removal. The Police Department may issue parking citations or even have vehicles towed that are parked on the street during or shortly after a snow storm. Residents should also be mindful to keep all obstructions such as basketball hoops, trailers, trash cans, etc. off the streets during snow removal.

Clearing Driveways

Frequently we receive calls of snow being depositing at the end of driveways or in front of mailboxes by the plows. We understand that this is extremely frustrating to our residents. When snow is plowed to the side of the road the resulting windrow will flow into the newly shoveled drive approach. Because our first priority is to clear the road and create a safe travel way, it is not an option to raise the plow blade at every drive approach. We ask for your understanding and cooperation. Clearing a 10-foot area of the oncoming lane shoulder may help.



Recycling Tip

During this holiday season remember to utilize your blue recycling bin. Before you toss, take a moment to determine what is recyclable! Remember to recycle boxes, wrapping paper, tissue paper, holiday cards and envelopes, and paper gift bags. Items such as bubble wrap, ribbon, laminated gift bags, styrofoam packing material, and anything found on your Christmas tree should be placed in the trash.

Recreation Programs

Highland participates with Cedar Hills City Recreation. All programs are available with no additional non-resident fees. The cost is \$160 for the lift ticket, two-hour lesson each week, and a half day on the slopes.

Jr. Jazz allows kids to develop skills and learn good sportsmanship while having fun. Teams open for boys and girls in the second through ninth grades. The game season runs from early January through mid-March. Online registration is now open.

InMotion Junior Golf programs will be offered all winter long for kids ages 4-17. The weekly program includes use of swing hitting bays, chipping, and an indoor putting green, as well as rules and etiquette. Lessons held at the InMotion indoor golf facility in Lindon. Students are placed in classes based on age and skill level, and the student-to-instructor ratio is 6:1. The cost is \$79.

The Smith's were both born in Scotland and were married in 1875. It is not known when they joined the Mormon Church but they migrated to America in 1882 and settled in Salt Lake City.

They came to Highland around 1890 with their three youngest children: James, Jane and Joseph. They had three older children, one had died and the other two were living elsewhere. Their youngest, Hyrum was born in Highland in 1891.
