

Road Study and Funding

For the past year, City Council has taken a focused look at road maintenance and funding. A study was conducted, a maintenance and reconstruction plan formed, and multiple public meetings held regarding this topic. As a result, on May 16, City Council voted to create a Transportation Utility Fund. This fund would be dedicated for the operation, improvement, maintenance, and rehabilitation of roads and funded through an \$18.50 per month Transportation Fee on each utility account. That fee was scheduled to begin on July 1, 2017.



On Monday, May 22, a group of citizens filed a petition for referendum which places the Transportation Utility Fund and Fee on hold, and allows the citizen group to collect signatures to place the item on the ballot. The petitioners need to collect at least 1,210 valid signatures by Friday, July 7. If the signature count is met, this item will go on the November ballot.

Election Changes

VOTE BY MAIL

Congressman Chaffetz announced that he will be stepping down from office on June 30, 2017. This will require a “special election” to fill the vacancy in that office. Because Highland is one of the many cities that make up the Third Congressional District, this “special election” is considered a Federal Election and as such is conducted by Utah County.

Utah County has made the decision to conduct these elections **ALL VOTE BY MAIL**

- Ballots are mailed to ALL registered voters approximately 21 days before an election date.
- The County will provide the return postage, so casting your vote won’t even need a stamp.
- After filling out your ballot, just put it in the envelope, sign the appropriate spaces and mail it back.
- Mailed ballots MUST be postmarked the day prior to the election date. August 14th for primary and November 6 for general election. (options for drop off ballots are being arranged)
- There will be NO early voting

REGISTER TO VOTE

- You must be registered in order to vote in the upcoming elections.
- Your voter registration information must be updated if you have moved or changed your name.
- Voter registration can be done online at Vote.Utah.Gov

May 2

The City Council voted to increase the cemetery burial plot fees by 3% on July 1 and every year hereafter. Excess money from the sales will be placed into a perpetual care fund that will be used to keep up with cemetery maintenance after all the plots are sold.

The Council amended the Development Code to allow election signs to be posted 45 days before the election.

May 16

Tibble Fork Release & Water Quality

In August of 2016, a dam-rehabilitation project at Tibble Fork Reservoir triggered a large release of sediment into the North Fork of the American Fork River.

After the sediment release, the Utah Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) conducted tests on samples & found high levels of metal in American Fork River's sediment, but lower concentrations in the water itself. Since that time, Highland City & DEQ have continued to monitor the situation. Prior to, and since the spill, neither agency has had cause to believe that Highland's pressurized irrigation (PI) or culinary water has been unsafe.

In April, out of an abundance of caution, DEQ tested soil samples from parks throughout our City since American Fork River water is mixed with additional sources to water our parks. The sample averages showed no significant levels of metals or contaminants. Our soil is safe and the PI water is safe to use for its intended purpose of irrigation, livestock, and recreation. 
