## Road Study and Fee

For the past year, City Council has taken a focused look at road maintenance and funding. A study was conducted, a maintenance and reconstruction plan formed, and multiple public meetings held regarding this topic. As a result, on May 16, City Council voted to create a Transportation Utility Fund. This fund is dedicated for the operation, improvement, maintenance, and rehabilitation of roads and funded through an \$18.50 per month Transportation Fee on each utility account. That fee was scheduled to begin on July 1, 2017.

On May 22, a group of citizens filed a petition for referendum which placed the Transportation Utility Fund and Fee on hold, and allowed the citizen group to collect signatures to place the item on the ballot. Ultimately, the petitioners decided against collecting signatures. As such, the Transportation Fund and Fee will begin August 1. The \$18.50 fee will be reflected on your August bill and road projects will begin in spring of 2018.

## Highland City Municipal Elections

- All vote by mail
- No early voting will take place
- No polling locations
- Ballots are mailed to ALL registered voters approximately 21 days before an election date. (July 24 for the Primary and October 17 for the General)
- The County will provide the return postage so casting your vote won't need a stamp.
- After filling out your ballot, just put it in the envelope, sign the appropriate spaces, and mail it back.
- Mailed ballots MUST be postmarked no later than the day prior to the election date (August 14 for Primary Election and November 6 for General Election)
- Ballots may be dropped off at the Highland City Office any time during regular business hours of 7:30AM – 6:00PM and on Election Day between 7:00AM - 8:00PM.
- A Service Center will be available at the Highland City Hall on Election Day to assist with lost or spoiled ballots and dropped off ballots.

## Road Construction Projects

### 11800 North and Highland Boulevard Intersection

In order to provide a safer area for school crossings, the City will be narrowing the road width and adding reduced speed signs. Crews will work to ensure substantial completion of the project happens prior to school starting.

### 4800 West and Alpine Highway Intersection

In order to facilitate better traffic flow, a right turn only lane will be added for those traveling south on 4800 West and turning west onto Alpine Highway. Crews will work to ensure substantial completion of the project happens prior to school starting.

### July 18

The preliminary plat was approved for Oak Ridge, a 37 lot single family subdivision development located at 6475 West 11800 North. The developer will now work with staff on their Final Plat application & Civil Plans before coming back to City Council at a future date.

The Conditional Use Permit & Site Plan was approved for a dentist and medical office located at 11020 N 5500 W. The developer will now work with staff to finalize corrections and begin the building process. In order to help deter commercial traffic from traveling along 5500 West, the City will add traffic calming measures.

A contract was approved for a Comprehensive Financial Sustainability Plan. This will allow the City to analyze revenue and expenses within the General Fund and forecast where the City will be at buildout.

## 2017 Water Conservation

Lately, we have been experiencing a higher volume of water usage than normal in our PI system. In order to maintain water pressure and volumes, residents need to water based on the City's Water Conservation Policy. Please adjust your watering schedule according to the water conservation schedule below:

### Watering Schedule:

- Even Address: Monday, Wednesday, & Friday
- Odd Address: Tuesday, Thursday, & Saturday
- No Sunday Residential Watering. This allows the storage facilities to fill.
- Recommended watering hours 6:00 PM - 10:00 AM

Adhering to this schedule helps us to maintain the water pressure for everyone. If you're experiencing brown spots or dry areas, try cleaning your filter or spot watering.

## Alpine School District (ASD)

### Records Destruction Notice

ASD is required to give public notice before destroying archived special education records. If you were born between Jan. 1, 1990 & Dec. 31, 1990, received special education services through ASD, & want to claim copies of your records before they are destroyed, contact Sarah Jackson at 801-610-8410 before Friday, December 8, 2017. Records will be destroyed at the end of 2017.

### Child Find

ASD is responsible for Child Find identification & evaluation for all students ages birth to 21 who are in ASD boundaries, are suspected of having a disability, & are in need of an evaluation for possible special education or early intervention services. This includes children who attend public or private schools, those being home schooled, & children who attend public or private preschool/daycare programs or are at home.

If a child is having significant difficulty with communication, behavior, academic learning, or fine/gross motor skills, or experiencing delayed development for his/her age, he/she may have a disability that requires specialized instruction through special education. If you suspect that your child may have a disability, even though he or she is advancing from grade to grade, contact your neighborhood school principal or ASD's special education department at 801-10-8410. If your child's age is birth to five years, contact the Early Childhood Assessment Center at 801-610-8857. If you suspect that a child that you know may have a disability, please share this information with the child's guardian.

### Carson Smith Scholarship Program

If you are the parent of a child with an IEP enrolled in a public school, we are required by Utah Code Section 53A-1a-704(10) to inform you of the availability of a scholarship to attend a private school through the Carson Smith Scholarship Program. 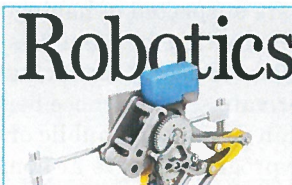

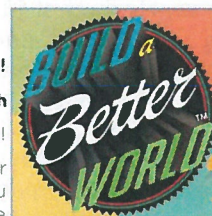
