September 5

Lehi City presented a plan for a Dry Creek Lake. The project is generally located at the southeast corner of SR92 and Highland Boulevard (behind Smith's Marketplace). The project will include water storage and recreation amenities including trails, a beach area, a dock for non-motorized boats, picnic areas, parking, and restrooms. Plans are still being finalized and construction is set to begin in 2018. The City will continue to work with all stakeholders and communicate updates to residents.

The Library presented an expansion plan utilizing existing space at City Hall. City Council and the Library Board will continue to work together on this project.

September 19

Civic Events Coordinator Julie Tapusoa gave a report on the 2017 Fling. Overall it was a good year that included extra events to celebrate Highland's 40th year as a City. From a budget perspective, City funds subsidized the Fling close to the same amount as in previous years.

Garbage Services

Recently, we have heard an increase in complaints relating to garbage pickup. As a result, City staff held a meeting with Republic Services in an effort to resolve the issues. Below is a message from Republic Services.

Dear Highland Residents,

We have been made aware of some issues as it relates to your trash and recycling collection services. We want you to know that we are committed to providing the best service we possibly can and are taking immediate action to rectify these issues. We have great, qualified, and caring drivers who want to do their best in your city. We greatly value our relationship with Highland and have met with City Administration and are working as partners to eliminate future service setbacks. Thank you for your patience.

City staff is committed to continuing to work with Republic Services to address citizen issues. Help us by following these guidelines:

- Have containers to the curb by 7:00 AM on collection day.
- Make sure your container's lid can shut fully.
- Place containers at least 3 feet apart from each other and 5 feet away from all other objects.
- Ensure clearance above a container from trees, wires, etc. is at least 14 feet.
- Bag your grass and other loose garbage.
- DO NOT bag recyclables.
- Break down/flatten cardboard boxes when putting into recycling container.

Burn Permits

PI Shut Off for the Season

Beginning on October 16, Public Works will begin draining and winterizing the pressurized irrigation (PI) system. While you may see water in the system after the 16, water pressure will diminish rapidly as ponds are drawn down. This is a good time to winterize your system as well to prevent damage caused by frozen water left in pipes, sprinklers, filters, and valves. Don't forget to close your main valve which is located in a box installed as part of your sprinkling system often in close proximity to the City's PI box. By closing this valve, flooding in the spring may be avoided should pipes freeze and break during the winter. This will also help to protect your system from pressure fluctuations experienced when the system is charged in April. Highland Historical Society

Monthly Story—Martin George Miller

The oldest, continuously occupied home in Highland is located at 10595 North 5600 West. The home was built in 1910 by Boise and Emma Miller Wells. Boise (pronounced Boyce) was a prosperous sheep rancher who had a number of herders working for him, and the herd manager was Charlie Parker. Emma hired her niece, Luetta Miller to keep house for her and she and Charlie met, courted and were married in 1915 and built a two room cabin in the orchard on the farm.

On October 23, 1918 the flu epidemic took Charlie, leaving Luetta with 2 young children. Boise than asked his brother-in-law, Martin George Miller, (Luetta's father) to take Charlie's place, and by Thanksgiving he had moved his large family in with Boise and Emma. In a few weeks Boise moved his family to American Fork and the Miller's remained in the home until 1923 or 1924 then moved to a home on the Alpine highway (5340 W 11200 N) and lived there until 1934.
