### October 3

City staff informed the Council of the need to begin replacing snow plow vehicles. Staff has made significant repairs to the vehicles, mostly in house in attempts to save money and prolong the life of the trucks. Unfortunately, many of the trucks are now coming to an end of their useable life. Staff and Council are working together to come up with the best replacement solution. A plan will be presented at the November 14 Council meeting.

### October 17

City Council gave clearance for the Library to expand into the multi-purpose room. Plans are being finalized and the process will begin this year.

Staff and Council discussed the next steps of the Road Plan. Repair work such as crack sealing is taking place now. 2018 reconstruction projects will go out to bid next month and based on pricing, final plans will be made. ## 2017 Election Information

Election Day is Tuesday, November 7. The following individuals are running for municipal office—Mayor: Jessie Schoenfeld and Rod Mann and City Council: Scott L. Smith, Christopher Kemp, Kurt Ostler, and Dennis LeBaron. The City held a Candidate Debate on Thursday, October 12 at City Hall. The election will be conducted with the same Vote-by-Mail system used in the primary election. There will be no early voting or polling locations. Ballots were mailed to all registered voters the week of October 23. Return postage is provided, so you don't even need a stamp. Simply fill out your ballot, sign it, and drop it in the mailbox. Ballots must be postmarked by Monday, November 6 in order to count. A service center will be available at Highland City Hall on election day from 7:00AM—8:00PM to assist with lost, spoiled, and dropped off ballots. Ballots can also be dropped off early at City Hall Monday—Thursday from 7:30AM—6:00PM. Please return your ballots quickly. The sooner ballots can be processed, the quicker results will be available. ## Highland Historical Society

### Monthly Story—Electricity Comes to Highland

There are a variety of stories about the coming of electricity-probably because it came to different parts of Highland in different years.

The power plants in American Fork Canyon were built long before any of the electricity was available for use by the local residents. The lower power plant, at the mouth of the canyon, across from the canyon road to Cedar Hills, was built in 1900 and had 2 GE 325 KVA generators. The upper plant, about two miles above (one building still remains), was built in 1907 and had 2 Westinghouse 667 KVA generators. There were four homes at the lower plant and it took four men to operate it. The upper plant was operated by one man and there was one residence there. Utah County Light & Power was organized Aug 2, 1899 and UP&L was organized Sep 6, 1912. Lehi City built their own power plant at 300 N and 500 W. Story continued at <http://bit.ly/HC-historical>.

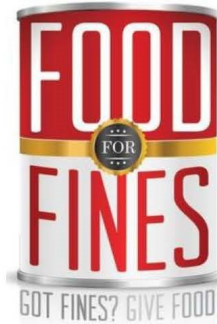
