Welcome Chief Thompson!

On Tuesday, November 21, the Lone Peak Public Safety Board hired Reed Thompson to be the new chief of Lone Peak Fire District beginning Friday, December 29.

Thompson went through a rigorous and competitive process which included candidates from all over the country and numerous interviews including interviewing with Fire Chiefs of surrounding cities.



Thompson has been in the fire service for nearly 20 years including 12 in American Fork and 10 South Jordan. For the past year and a half, he has served as the Deputy Chief in South Jordan. Thompson obtained his Bachelor of Science in Public Emergency Services Management from Utah Valley University and a Master of Public Administration from Brigham Young University.

While Thompson is certainly qualified on a professional level, he also has local roots. Thompson grew up in Highland and as such understands not only our geography, but our culture and values as well.

The District is excited to have Thompson on board. This will allow us to begin a new chapter and improve the services to the residents of the Lone Peak Fire District.

December 5

The final plats were approved for Oak Ridge A (37 lot single-family development at 6475 West 11800 North) and Ruby Estates A (16 lot single-family development at 10400 North 6000 West). Both developers will now work with staff to finalize plans and will then begin construction.

City Council passed the mid-year budget amendments. The major changes are noted below. Visit <http://bit.ly/HC-budget> to see the full list of amendments.

- Creation of a Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund to manage all Cemetery expenses and revenues
- Purchase of an electronic portable sign to use for advertising
- Purchase of two new snow plows

The Conditional Use Permit for an LDS Church located at 11300 N Highland Boulevard was approved. The builder will now work with staff to finalize plans before building. The project is estimated to be completed in April 2019.

City Council approved the contract for construction of a right turn lane from 4800 West to SR 92. The work will begin after school lets out, summer 2018.

Community Recycling Bins

Did you know that there are recycling bins for cardboard and paper at Heritage and Mitchell Hollow Parks? They are open to use for all residents. The contents of the bin are then recycled into insulation and the proceeds go towards the Highland City Youth Council.

As you use the bin, please help us make sure the materials are useable by following these tips:

- Wrapping paper, ribbons, styrofoam, and bows can not be recycled through this method.
- Make sure that bin lid is closed to keep the rain and snow out. Wet items can not be used.

- Boxes must be broken down before being placed in the bin.

Beautification Committee

GUIDELINES TO ENSURE CONSISTENT SERVICE

- If a holiday (only those shown above on calendar) falls on a weekday, service will be delayed one day following the holiday.
- Recycle containers that have trash in them will **NOT** be dumped as recycling and called into the city.
- All containers **MUST** be placed outside by **7 a.m.**
- Containers should be placed in the street with the wheels against the curb or within **2 feet** of blacktop with the front of the container facing the street.
- The container must be placed **4 feet** apart from other containers and **8 feet** from mailboxes, poles, fences, trees, or parked vehicles for easy access.
