Amazing Volunteers

In April we honored two residents who have quietly served the community for years. First was Laura Dawson who has chaired the Beautification Committee nearly five years. She has implemented programs such as "Yard of the Month" and "Adopt a Patch" which has helped to beautify the city, provide opportunities for volunteerism, and improve pride in our community. She also organized "Garden Tours" during the Fling. Second was Shauna Larson who has served as the Director of the Arts Council for seven years. She is the driving force behind the Council and brings incredible events and programs to Highland! She has brought in various types of artists from musicians, potters, painters, thespians and more. She's formed groups for stitchery, watercolors, theater workshops and productions, art shows, hand chimes, string ensembles, flute circles, choirs, art appreciation ,and more. She teaches many classes herself for both adults and youth. Shauna collaborates with nearly every department in the City and ensures there's a beautiful display of rotating art in City Hall. Water Conservation

We would like to remind residents to conserve water by following the watering schedule sent out by staff and discussed later in this newsletter. A great way to save water is to upgrade your sprinkler controller to a smart controller. These connect to your home internet and adjust your watering schedule based on the weather. Purchasers of smart controllers can apply for a rebate from the Central Utah Water Conservancy District beginning May 1. In 2017, the program allowed you get a 50% rebate off a purchase of up to \$150. A common question we get is, why the city waters parks in the rain. The answer is, we have several hundred controllers that would need to be manually turned off, which takes a couple of days. Then of course, they have to be turned on again. All of the City's "new" installs such as Beacon Hills Park and new parkway details have smart sensors to help us water only the appropriate amount. Unfortunately all of our older parks such as Heritage, Highland Glen, etc. do not have the sensors installed. We are working to retroactively install as budget allows.

April 10

The first draft of the Tentative Budget was presented. An updated draft will be given to Council and published on the website on May 1. The planned schedule is for Council to adopt the Tentative Budget on May 15 and Final Budget June 5. Residents are invited to make comments at any meetings or at the Open House on May 3.

April 17

City Council approved a rezoning request of 5.5 acres located at 5959 W 10100 N from R-1-40 to R-1-20 zone. An application of referendum was filed on this zoning change meaning that the decision is currently placed on hold and may be placed on the ballot for voter approval. Water Conservation

You may have noticed that the Pressurized Irrigation (PI) system is now ready for use. In regard to the water/snowpack conditions, one word will sum it up - awful. The American Fork River system, where the City receives the majority of PI water, is estimated to be at 50% of average. The City has planned for drought conditions by acquiring groundwater and stored reservoir water rights. However, as a City, we still need to conserve water. A recent review of water use determined the City as a whole uses almost double the amount of water that is necessary for outdoor watering. Over consumption of water places an undue strain on the City's water delivery system. To reduce the need for costly improvements a 20% decrease in water usage is needed.

Please reduce your outdoor water use by appropriately setting your timers. The State of Utah has a great tool that recommends watering based on weather patterns and evapotranspiration rates for each week of the year. It can be found at ConserveWaterUtah.gov and on the City's webpage. Please utilize this site to assist in knowing how many days your lawn needs water each week.

Even and Odd watering days will still be required with Sundays as a no watering day. Residents with an even address water on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday while residents with an odd address water on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Your combined efforts will make a considerable difference in water use.

Garbage Pickup Time

As a reminder, Republic Service starts collecting cans at 7:00 AM. Please remember to have your cans out on the curb by then so yours isn't missed.

Lone Peak Police Honors

The Lone Peak Police Department (LPPD) is an outstanding organization with amazing officers. Recently, two of the members of the force received awards from the Utah Chiefs of Police. In the small department category, Officer Brett Wagstaff was awarded Officer of the Year and Chief Brian Gwilliam received Chief of the Year.

Some great examples of Officer Wagstaff's work are performing CPR two separate times to save lives and frequently spending his own money to help those in need. According to Chief Gwilliam, he also "...treats everyone with the same respect, regardless if they are victim or suspect. He separates the person from the offense and recognizes that good people make bad decisions."

Chief Gwilliam served as interim Fire Chief of the Lone Peak Fire Department from July 1-December 31. During that time, there were complicated personnel issues, personnel recruitment, two wildfires, and a state audit. Each of these were handled professional and efficiently without incident. Chief Gwilliam never took personal credit and never allowed either the Fire or Police Department to suffer due to the demands on his time.

Please join with us in congratulating Officer Wagstaff and Chief Gwilliam on their well deserved awards. Thank you to all of LPPD for everything you do to serve our community.
