Mayor's Message

Resident Survey Responses

I have been reviewing the 2018 Resident Survey data. Here are my responses to a couple of the most frequent comments/questions:

The city needs to do a better job of communicating with residents.

I believe we have made great strides over the past 4 years in this area. Yes we can always improve. There are several locations where residents can go online to get information: 1) www.highlandcity.org: This is the city web page where you can access city code, get phone numbers, review the calendar and news items, look up meeting minutes and agendas, and sign up via Notify Me for alerts on items such as meeting agendas and council actions. 2) www.facebook.com/highlandcity: Staff posts news items, city council meeting summaries, upcoming events, etc..... 3) bit.ly/MayorMannBlog: I post articles regarding current or upcoming issues.

Our roads are terrible; where did the money from the road fee go?

Our road fee was implemented last August and the money is going exclusively into road maintenance and rehabilitation. We are starting to use the funds this year. The biggest project for the year will be rehabilitating 6000 W from 10400 N to 11800 N. You can see the entire 7 year road plan at: bit.ly/HighlandRoads.

Thanks for all those who choose to engage with the city government and respectfully share their points of view. We all benefit from thoughtful discussions. We don't always get our way. I didn't as a member of City Council and don't as the Mayor. That being said, I often find that even though I didn't get exactly what I wanted, what we ended up with was better than my original wish because of the input of others.

May 1

An updated draft of the Tentative Budget was presented. It was adopted on May 15 and the Final Budget is expected to be passed on June 5. May 15

City Council approved a resolution designating Canyon Oaks as a campground. This campground is located at approximately 4000 W 11000 N (north side of S.R. 92 east of the PI pond and west of the mouth of American Fork Canyon). It has a fire-pit, 2 picnic tables, a large area that can be used for tents, and a permanent restroom available in the parking lot. It is now open for rentals.

2018 Road Projects

Major Road Construction will begin on June 1 and continue through July 31. Travel delays and some short term closures will take place on 6000 W from 10400 to 11800 N, 11350 N from 5600 to 5835 W, and Andrew Drive. All registered voters will receive ballots in the mail. For the primary election, you may return your ballot in any of the following ways:

- Mail in your ballot by Monday, June 25
- Drop off your ballot at any Early Service Center beginning Tuesday, June 19 through Thursday, June 21 from 12:00-7:00 PM or Friday, June 22 from 12:00-5:00 PM
- Bring your ballot to any Election Day Service Center on June 26 from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

Highland City will serve as both an Early and Election Day Service Center. For a list of other Service Centers go to www.utahcounty.gov. Vacant Lot Maintenance

Fireworks season is coming and there is always an increase in the potential for fires related to uncontrolled weeds. Please make sure you are maintaining the landscaping on your property. This is especially important if you own property which is a vacant lot.

Forest Service Reminders

Firework Ban

State law allows fireworks to be discharged from July 2-July 5, July 22-July 25, December 31 from 11:00AM – January 1 at 1:00AM, and February 5 from 11:00AM – February 6 at 1:00AM.

On May 5, 2018 City Council voted to ban fireworks in: Beacon Hills Subdivision; Bull River Subdivision, drainage areas, and surrounding property; Chambery Fields Subdivision; Country French Subdivision; Dry Creek Highland Subdivision and drainage areas; Hidden Oaks Subdivision, Highland Glen Park; Highland Hills Subdivision; Highland Hollow Subdivision and drainage areas; Highland Oaks Subdivision; Hunter Ridge Subdivision; Lone Peak High School; Mercer Hollow Subdivision; Mitchell Hollow Park and drainage areas; Mouth of American Fork Canyon; Skye Estates Subdivision; State owned property south of Lone Peak High School, Sterling Pointe Subdivision; Sunset Mountain Properties; Town Center Splash Pad; View Point Subdivision; west side of 10150 North; and Westfield Cove Subdivision. 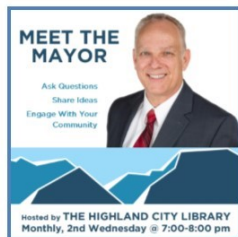
