

Mayor's Message

Here are some positive developments that are occurring in our fair city:

- The state has offered up 112 acres of land south of Lone Peak HS up for sale or lease. Bids are due by the end of August. The land is designated as mixed use in our General Plan. Any of us who have north of \$23M to spare should have a shot at purchasing the land :) See <https://dfcm.utah.gov/real-estate/#sale>.
- The library is planning to have enough in its collection before the end of the year to qualify as a full member of the North Utah County Library Cooperative. This means that Highland Library card holders will be able to check out materials from the American Fork, Eagle Mountain, Lehi, Pleasant Grove, or Saratoga Springs libraries at no additional cost.
- Speaking of the library, we are taking applications for openings on the Library Board. Anyone interested in applying please fill out an application and contact me for an interview. See <http://bit.ly/HC-volunteer>
- Watch for a motion to revise our city code to disallow political signs on public property in August. A few years ago, the code was revised to allow political signs to be placed on public property. These signs create additional work for our parks department, block sprinklers, and can create safety hazards. Let me know your thoughts.

June 5

Planning Commission Chair, Chris Kemp gave a presentation on the Planning Commission and he and City Council held a discussion for how they could better work together. In addition, City Council approved the Highland City Comprehensive Fee Schedule beginning July 1, 2018. The major changes include a 3% increase to the price of a cemetery plot and various event and Fling changes.

June 12

Financial Consultants, Lewis, Young, Robertson, and Burningham are conducting a study on the General Fund and future expenses and revenues. City Council has asked staff to reconsider the timing of expenses to provide a more stable increase over time. Additional analysis will be presented to Council at a later time.

June 19

City Council finalized the FY18 (July 2017—June 2018) Budget and passed the FY19 (July 2018—June 2019) Budget. Next year's major expenses include a salt-storage shed, an addition of a police officer, additional fire fighters, and one-time capital expenses for the Fire Department. Road Work

We know that the construction season in Highland is inconvenient and frustrating as we work to make some long overdue repairs to one of our major collector roads—6000 West. Please be patient, slow down, and use caution! We want to keep the construction workers and our residents safe and impact adjacent property owners as little as possible.

6000 W from south of SR-92

Geneva Rock is pulverizing the asphalt and repairing subgrade sections in preparation of asphalting after July 4. They will be pouring concrete during the next two weeks and will have the work complete in time for the Highland Fling parade August 4.

6000 W from north of SR-92

Geneva Rock is laying the leveling course now and will have the asphalt done by July 4. They will come back and collar manholes and valves in July. Traffic control will remain up until that work is done. Striping will take place in conjunction with the south portion toward the end of July. All work will be completed by July 31.

4800 W Right Turn Lane

Rocky Mountain Power will be relocating a power pole shortly. Traffic will be shifted while the work is done and residents should expect delays in the area for the next three to four weeks.

Firework Ban

State law allows fireworks to be discharged from July 2-July 5, July 22-July 25, December 31 from 11:00AM – January 1 at 1:00AM, and February 5 from 11:00AM – February 6 at 1:00AM.

On May 5, 2018 City Council voted to ban fireworks in: Beacon Hills Subdivision; Bull River Subdivision, drainage areas, and surrounding property; Chambery Fields Subdivision; Country French Subdivision; Dry Creek Highland Subdivision and drainage areas; Hidden Oaks Subdivision, Highland Glen Park; Highland Hills Subdivision; Highland Hollow Subdivision and drainage areas; Highland Oaks Subdivision; Hunter Ridge Subdivision; Lone Peak High School; Mercer Hollow Subdivision; Mitchell Hollow Park and drainage areas; Mouth of American Fork Canyon; Skye Estates Subdivision; State owned property south of Lone Peak High School, Sterling Pointe Subdivision; Sunset Mountain Properties; Town Center Splash Pad; View Point Subdivision; west side of 10150 North; and Westfield Cove Subdivision. Parks Update

Highland City Parks Department works very hard to maintain your parks. We experience all of the same problems that our residents do, just on a much larger scale. With over 180 acres of grass to care for, it is an ongoing battle to keep our own filters and sprinkler heads working optimally. Our parks typically water three days each week and we don't increase that after fixing a sprinkler problem. As such, dry areas typically come back slowly.

Pressurized Irrigation Water

Currently over 50% of Highland City's pressurized irrigation water is coming from our Central Utah Project (Deer Creek) allotment. In past years we have not had to utilize this water until later into August. This is typically a 'dirtier' water in that there is moss, sands, and silts. Residents should be extra diligent in cleaning their system filters regularly.

Also, please conserve when and where possible and abide by the watering guidelines. While it is not always aesthetically pleasing to see brown spots or dry areas, over watering can also result in these problems. We all need to be wise stewards of our natural resources.

Youth Council Corner

At our May meeting we had the opportunity to meet with our Justice Court Judge, Kelly Schaeffer-Bullock. She enlightened us with various information about a day in the life of a Judge and the education and experience path needed to become a Judge, as well as her sincere desire to help others through her service. We've also been assisting with preparations for the Highland Fling. We held a work day for our Fling Kids Night Cardboard Challenge and will be doing another one on July 18 from 12:00 – 2:00 PM at the Splash Pad. Kids can join us to get supplies and/or get started on their space themed project. We are also busy preparing for our Fling Youth Night on August 3, a drive-in movie featuring Jumanji and food trucks. It will be a really fun event!

Town Center Splash Pad

The splash pad is such a fun venue and we want to make certain that everyone can enjoy it. Please review the park rules at http://bit.ly/HC_Splash and be courteous of others using the pad. Daily maintenance is required on the water supply and is performed from 2:50—4:00 PM daily. Unfortunately, from time to time there are unforeseen things that happen that require us to shut the system down and perform unscheduled cleaning or maintenance.
