2. PRESENTATIONS

a. UDOT I-15 Tech Corridor Project – Craig Hancock and Courtnee Bovee

Courtnee Bovee and Craig Hancock with UDOT provided an overview for the I-15 Technology Corridor project that will be underway from Spring 2018 until Spring of 2020. The Council was able to ask several questions and a healthy discussion took place. 5. ORDINANCE: AMENDMENT TO VIOLATIONS IN THE HIGHLAND CITY MUNICIPAL PARKS AND CEMETERY CODE - PASSED

City Council will consider amendments to the Highland City Municipal Code, Title 12 City Parks and Cemetery to include penalties for violations. The Council will take appropriate action.

Next Step: The City Code and Justice Court will be updated with amendments passed.

 - *The results from the resident survey were presented and overall, they were positive and informative. Changes requested by Council will be made and then the results will be posted online and in the April newsletter.*
- d. Infant Cemetery Creation** - Cindy Quick, City Recorder
 - *Staff asked for direction on whether or not they were interested in creating an infant section in the cemetery. Council direction was to bring back more information with a comparison to other cemeteries for best practices.*



PROJECT OVERVIEW


The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) will reconstruct the I-15 Technology Corridor between Lehi Main Street and S.R. 92 (Timpanogos Highway) starting in 2018. The Tech Corridor is the last section of I-15 in Utah County to be reconstructed in recent years.
