



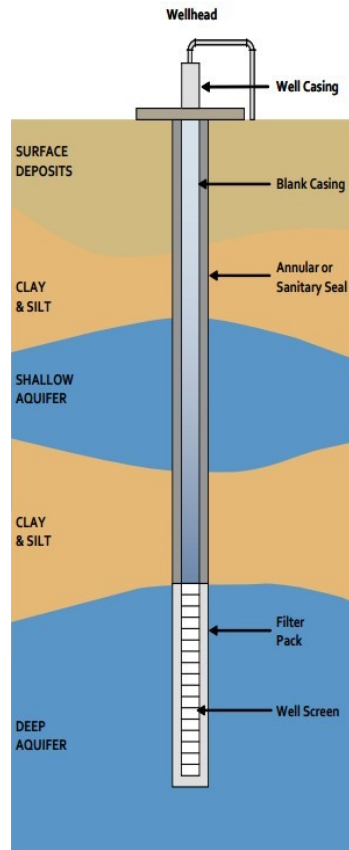

Mayor's Message

When we turn on our tap, seldom do we ask, "How does such clear water make it to our homes?". The City's drinking water system is one of those 'out of sight, out of mind' utilities that we often take for granted. The original Highland City water system was created in 1958 by residents who believed that a central water system would be a great benefit to the community.

Our drinking water system is comprised of a pipe network, concrete water tanks, pump stations, and well houses. These wells (~ 600 ft. below the surface) pump water from aquifers which are fed by water that begins as snowmelt within the Wasatch Mountains. The pumps draw the water up to the surface where it is stored in large concrete water tanks. From the tanks, the water is fed into miles of pipeline via gravity.

Highland City staff, who are certified by the State of Utah, regularly sample and test the water to ensure that it meets the Utah Division of Drinking Water standards. Because of our natural high water quality, we do not have to add any chemicals to our water. I would like to thank our staff for their diligence in managing the water system so that we have the uncommon luxury of enjoying pristine water directly from our taps.



Council Brief

February 5

City Council approved the final plat of a one lot subdivision (0.8 acres) located at 9913 North 6180 West. Staff will now work with the applicant on design and engineering before construction begins.

City Council approved a contract to line 4,000 linear feet of sewer main line in the Pheasant Hollow and Hidden Oak Subdivisions. This process reduces groundwater infiltration into our pipes which saves the City money in treatment costs and at the same time increases the pipe's life expectancy by an estimated 50 years. Staff will work with the homes that will be impacted to ensure a smooth process occurs.

February 21

The developer of the property south of Lone Peak High School presented updated plans to City Council. See more information on page 2.

City Council denied the request to remove Neighborhood Option Trails in the Canterbury North Subdivision. A couple of the concerns Council expressed were that (1) the trail is paved whereas all other trails that have been removed have not been paved and (2) moving a pressurized irrigation line connection at the end of this trail would cost an estimated \$15,000. Council did request that staff look to amend the fencing restrictions and for a funding mechanism for the maintenance of trails.

City Council approved the Conditional Use Permit for a Park Maintenance Building on the northeast corner of Mountain Ridge Park. See page 2 for more information.

Mountain Ridge Park Update

On January 29, Planning Commission held a Public Hearing for the Conditional Use Permit on the Park. Planning Commission split this Permit into two separate issues: (1) the Park Maintenance Building and (2) park amenities.

First, Planning Commission approved a Park Maintenance building to be built on the northeast corner of the property. Council subsequently approved that Permit on February 19. Construction on the facility will likely begin late spring.

Second, Planning Commission postponed their decision regarding park amenities until sound and traffic studies could be completed. Staff is currently working to hire firms to complete those studies. When they are complete, the Planning Commission will reconsider the Conditional Use Permit and forward their recommendation to City Council. Final financing plans and any phasing would then need to be determined prior to any construction beginning

Water Conservation & Pressurized Irrigation System

Water is the key to life. Even with a good snowpack year like this one, water conservation still needs to be on everyone's mind. Utah is still in a historic drought and it would take several years of above-average snowpack to end. In addition, past studies have shown that Highland residents use almost double the amount of water necessary for outdoor watering. We encourage all Highland residents to follow the Utah Division of Water Resources on social media for information on conservation, how often to water, rebates, and more.

Pressurized irrigation water will be ready for use by April 15. As the process to bring the system online usually takes 7-10 days, Public Works will begin recharging the system around April 1. Please make sure your stop and waste valves are shut off while the system is being loaded. If valves are not shut off, flooding may occur. Once the system is fully operational by April 15, individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

Next month we will highlight Highland's watering schedules and restrictions.

Developmental Center Property Development Update

At the February 19 City Council meeting, the developers of the Developmental Center Property (land south of Lone Peak High School) presented a summary of the feedback they have received and how they had adapted their plan based on that feedback.

The property will need to be rezoned in order for the developer to develop as they wish. The request for rezoning will be considered by the Planning Commission (tentatively planned for this spring) followed by City Council.

If the rezone is approved, subdivision plans would come to Planning Commission and City Council late this summer or early fall. In addition, a second Open House at a date to be determined is being planned and will be announced shortly. Canal Boulevard (East West Connector) Update

The Utah Department of Transportation and Highland City are currently working on the final design of the road and hope to have it complete in May. Construction will then begin fall of 2019 with the road finished summer 2020. Highland Historical Society Peas and Peaviners in Highland

In the 1940's through the 1970's, peas were an important crop in Highland. There were a number of canneries around the State that contracted with farmers to raise a certain number of acres of peas and they guaranteed to buy what the farmers raised.

Early in the year the canneries would send their field men out to contract with the famers and they would then monitor the farms through seeding, fumigation, irrigation and harvest. The farmers had to be ready to harvest their peas at a moment's notice when the field man determined that they were ready. 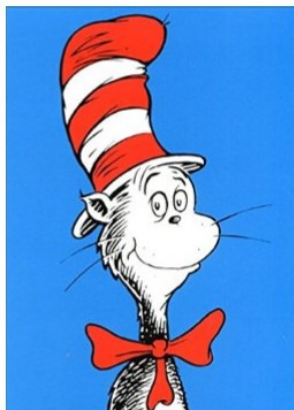
