For those who were unable to attend the Meet Your Candidates event in September, videos of each candidate's Q&A session are available on YouTube in the Utah's Highlander YouTube channel (<http://bit.ly/uthighlander>).

This year we had a high potential for flooding but did not experience any significant issues. Part of the reason was the gradual warming we had during the spring and summer. However, throughout the summer we experienced five to ten times the water flow from the canyon that we had last year. In fact even now we are experiencing three to four times the water flow (see <http://bit.ly/afriverflow>).

Aside from Providence's aid we had "boots on the ground", who during the spring and summer cleared the river channel, debris basin, and ditches in order to ensure that our basements did not get filled with water. The list of those who quietly served us include the US Forest & National Parks Services, UDOT, Highland City Public Works Department, Mark Thompson (former Mayor & Watermaster for Lehi Irrigation Company), Ernie John (AF City and AF Irrigation Watermaster), and Lehi City Public Works Department. We are very appreciative of their service as well as that of residents who saw issues and addressed them without any notice.

Thinking of the floods that did not happen reminds me that we often forget to thank those whose service helps avert disaster in all aspects of our lives. Let us take a moment and thank someone we normally wouldn't for making our lives better.

2019 Municipal Elections

Pressurized Irrigation Shut-off

Beginning on October 15, Public Works will begin draining and winterizing the pressurized irrigation (PI) system. While you may see water in the system after the 15, water pressure will diminish rapidly as ponds are drawn down. Winterize your system to prevent damage caused by frozen water left in pipes, sprinklers, filters, and valves. Don't forget to close your main valve, located in a box installed as part of your sprinkling system often in close proximity to the City's PI box. This will also help to protect your system from pressure fluctuations experienced when the system is charged in April. 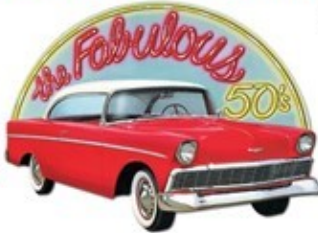

September 3

Staff gave an overview of the City's Pressurized Irrigation (PI) system and the need for conservation. The current PI system is being taxed due to overwatering, encroachment and landscaping of property that wasn't planned to be irrigated, and other issues. If the amount of water being used is not reduced, it will require expensive upgrades to the PI system. The State Legislature is also pushing for mandatory metering of PI systems. The estimated cost for metering the entire system is \$5 million. In the future, staff will ask Council for direction regarding matching funds to be able to apply for grants to meter the system, an Irrigation Meter Plan, and a City-wide Conservation Strategy.

City Council approved an ordinance ([5.24](#)) regulating short term rentals. Property owners who are interested in having a rental or who already have one should contact the City at 801-756-5751 to apply for a license.

September 17

The future Spring Creek Park, located at approximately 9900 North Mountain View Drive, is being developed with the money earned from selling approximately 10 acres around the park to a home developer. City Council directed staff to have the City rather than the developer be in charge of constructing the park. The budget for the park is \$375,000 and Council requested the following amenities: medium sized pavilion, playground, open grass area, and a sidewalk leading to each of the amenities. The Highland Foundation may also put in two pickleball courts in the park. The tentative completion date for the park is June 1, 2020.
