Referendum & Proposition Information Pamphlet

On December 3, 2019, City Council approved the Open Space Disposal and Removal of Neighborhood Trails in the Wimbleton Subdivision. On December 10, 2019, citizens of Highland City filed a referendum application challenging that law and ordered that it be referred to the voters for their approval at a future election.

As part of the referendum process, the City has produced a Proposition Information Pamphlet that includes: (1) a copy of the referendum application, (2) an argument prepared by the sponsors of the referendum, (3) an argument prepared by the majority of the City Council, and (4) a fiscal and legal impact statement. In order for the law to be placed on the ballot of an upcoming election, sponsors of the referendum are required to collect 1,183 valid signatures by February 20, 2020. The County and City will then verify the signatures by March 25, 2020 and communicate the results and the next steps at that time. Mayor's Message

Here's what's happening in Highland:

- Did you know that your winter culinary water use determines your sewer bill? It is a good idea to review your utility bill and check for unexplained increases in culinary water use. During the winter and spring, exterior water lines occasionally develop leaks due to freezes and thaws. Increased usage may also indicate leaky faucets or toilets. Addressing water issues early will not only reduce your culinary water bill, but can also prevent increases to your sewer bill.
- Our contract with Republic Services, our garbage and recycling pickup service provider, expires in June 30 of this year. The Council elected to have staff rebid the contract rather than renew again with Republic. We hope to have a decision made by April.
- I have had several discussions with Utopia Fiber (utopiafiber.com) about bringing fiber broadband services (250 Mbps to 10 Gbps) to Highland. They will be providing an overview of the options available to Highland at a work session with the City Council on Tuesday, February 4 at 6:00 PM in the Council Chambers. Everyone is welcome to attend. An online survey is available for you to express your level of interest in bringing this service to Highland (bit.ly/highland-fiber).
- I am happy to report that our new City Council is fully engaged in working to serve you. They are truly wonderful people. Thank them when you get a chance.

Council Brief

January 14

The Council approved the rehabilitation of two different wells in the City. The first one is a pressurized irrigation well on the north end of the City. The rehabilitation of this well is expected to provide increased water flow which will provide better pressure in the PI system in that area of the City. The second well rehabilitation is a culinary water well house just south of SR-92 across the street from the Kilgore pit. The building provides very poor ventilation for the well motor and the electrical is in need of replacement.

City Council passed a one-year moratorium on the disposal of Open Space and Removal of Neighborhood Option Trails. During this time the Council will work with staff to study and create plans dealing with the maintenance, costs, and disposal of parks, open space, and trails.

The City Council created a Parks, Trails, and Tree Commission (PTTC) which will serve as an advisory body with respect to park and trail improvements and any updates to the park and trail master plans. The PTTC will also review park and trail improvement requests and prioritize them based on the needs of the entire City. Finally, the PTTC will also organize volunteer activities to improve City parks and trails.

January 21

City Council approved some budget adjustments for the current year budget. Here are some of the larger adjustments:

- The Phone Tax Revenue line item was decreased by \$30,000 based on a decreasing collection trend.
- The Building Maintenance budget was increased by \$116,000 to pay for air conditioners for the City building and Justice Center that had to be replaced when the current units failed.
- The Capital Equipment line item was increased by \$33,800 to replace a truck in the Parks Department that was totaled in an accident.
- In total, in the General Fund, there was an increase in the previous years' revenue of \$216,000 due to a variety of unforeseen expenditures.
- The Library increased a variety of line items in their budget to pay for unexpected expenses. The Library is paying for those expenses using previous year's revenue.

2020 Highland Fling

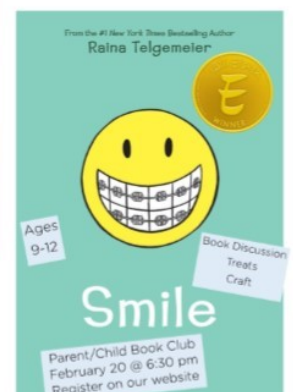
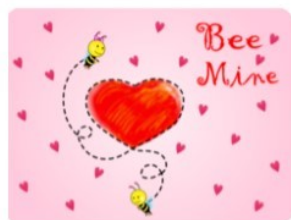
