2020 Resident Survey

If you are going to take the survey online do not click on the link until you are ready to take it. Surveys are due by Tuesday, March 31. Please only fill out one per household. There are 17 questions and none of them are required. If you have no opinion about any question, please skip it. Individual responses will not be tracked and will be kept anonymous. Survey results will be shared at a later time. Please take this opportunity to make your voice heard with the City!

Referendum Update

In December 2019, City Council approved the Open Space Disposal and Removal of Neighborhood Trails in the Wimbleton Subdivision. Thereafter, citizens of Highland filed a referendum application challenging that law and ordered that it be referred to the voters for their approval at a future election. In order for the law to be placed on the ballot of an upcoming election, sponsors of the referendum were required to collect 1,183 valid signatures by February 20. At the time of newsletter printing, Utah County has given the City preliminary indication that the sponsors have met that requirement. The final confirmation will occur by March 25. Council Brief

February 4

City Council ratified some staff changes. The former City Recorder left for another City and City Treasurer, Stephannie Cottle, was promoted to the Recorder position. Utility Billing and Processing Clerk, Candice Linford, has been promoted to the Treasurer position. Staff is currently working to fill the Utility Billing Clerk position. We congratulate these employees on their promotions. Both have exceeded expectations in their current positions and are deserving of these promotions because of their aptitude, hard work, and dedication to the residents of Highland over their tenure.

Council passed a resolution giving staff permission to potentially refund some of the City's bonds in order to save the City money. Initial estimates show the City might be able to save \$118,000 over seven years. The bonds will only be refinanced if the terms are in the best interest of the City in interest rate, length of bond, etc.

February 18

City Council approved changes to the Development Code to make it easier for residents to get a permit for an "accessory dwelling unit" such as a basement apartment or an apartment above the garage. The changes removed the need for applicants to get a conditional use permit and to separate out the utilities of their apartment from the main dwelling.

City staff briefed Council on the difficulties the City is experiencing lately with one of the sewer lift stations. The Victor View Lift Station is located south of Kaitlyn Lane and services the neighborhood north of it and east of 6400 West. Over the past five months, the lift station has continually become clogged with items including cleaning wipes, feminine hygiene products, wrappers, pill bottles, wire, and more. Because of the continual clogging, staff has had to put an enormous amount of resources into this one lift station that only services 56 homes. Council and staff discussed possible remedies including rerouting sewer lines to avoid the lift station. The project would cost approximately \$300,000. Council and staff also discussed the possibility of passing those costs onto just the homeowners who are serviced by this lift station and are causing the issue as opposed to everyone else in the City. Council asked staff to do more research and bring the item back for further discussion. Even if you don't live in this neighborhood or are serviced by a lift station, please remember the only thing that should be flushed down a toilet is toilet paper and human waste. "Flushable wipes" are really NOT flushable nor is grease, cat litter, feminine hygiene products, or the other items discussed above.

Pressurized Irrigation Water

Pressurized irrigation water will be ready for use by April 15. As the process to bring the system online takes 7-10 days, Public Works will begin recharging the system around April 1. Please make sure your stop and waste valves are shut off while the system is being loaded. If valves are not shut off, flooding may occur. Once the system is fully operational by April 15, individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

Next month we will highlight y watering schedules and conservation information. While we've had an above average snowpack again this year, water conservation is still important especially because past studies have shown that Highland residents use almost double the amount of water necessary for outdoor watering.

Highland City Cemetery Cleanup

Highland City seeks to offer families and friends that visit their loved ones resting in the cemetery a clean, beautiful, and peaceful environment. Please help us with this goal by keeping your site clean. The next cemetery decoration cleanup and removal will be on Monday, March 2. All perishable items will be discarded and all trinkets, shepherd-crooks, etc. will be removed and put in a storage facility on site. Items can be claimed Thursday, March 5 from 8:00 AM—12:00 PM. 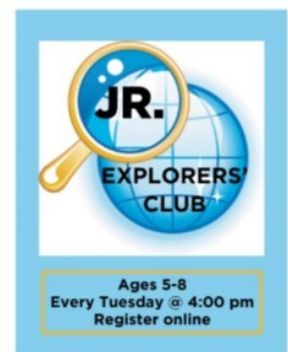
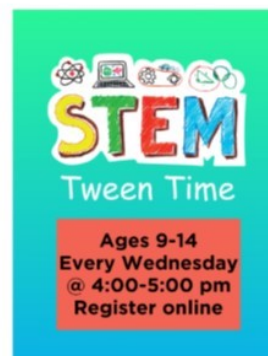
