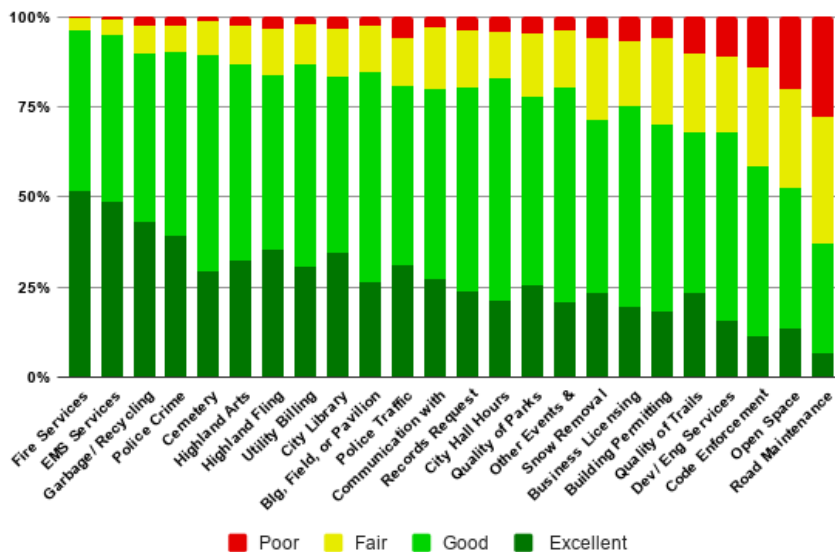

Mayor's Message

We most definitely live in interesting times. During 2020, many of us have experienced personally painful events. These have been exacerbated by COVID-19 and other surprises. In Jamil Zaki's book, *The War for Kindness*, he shares information from a study that many will recognize to be accurate based on personal experience. "Psychologists ... measured the number of painful life events individuals had experienced throughout their lives—things like car accidents, severe illness, or victimization by crime. These people then came to the lab, where they met another participant who was struggling with a frustrating task. Participants stepped in to help this other person, and those who had suffered most were the most helpful, even if their painful experiences had occurred long before. When survivors help others, they also help themselves. 'Victims' are often stereotyped as weakened by trauma, but many emerge stronger and more fulfilled. 'Post-traumatic growth'—including greater spirituality, stronger relationships, and a renewed sense of purpose—is almost as common as PTSD."



I hope we can take the lemons of life and turn them into lemonade. Speaking of turning lemons into lemonade, below is a chart of the city service ratings from the 2020 Resident Survey.

Our lowest ranked service was road maintenance with only 38% rating it as good or excellent. While this is not

great, it is 2X better than the 2016 survey, where the combined rating was 19%. We are moving the needle in the right direction.

Another positive note is that we've been able to help Alpine School District by covering the cost of adding touchless drinking fountains and other items for schools in Highland using federal CARES Act money. We are also using these funds to cover a number of other COVID related city expenses – I will share the details next month. I frequently say this, but the sentiment is genuine; thanks for all you do to make Highland a wonderful place to live.

Accessory Dwelling Units

An Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) is a separate living space in a home such as a basement or loft apartment. According to City Code, all ADU's must be registered with the City and the construction of an ADU requires a building permit. To be approved, all ADUs must meet certain guidelines such as:

- Be attached to the main dwelling unit which must be owner occupied. Pool houses, lofts above shops, etc. are NOT permitted.
- Meet all fire, safety, health, and building code requirements.
- The ADU entrance shall be from the rear of the home or a camouflaged side entrance not visible to the street.
- The front of the home shall not appear to have separate units.

Council Brief

September 1

City Council approved the purchase of new bathrooms at the following City Parks: two at Highland Glen, one at Heritage Park, and one at Beacon Hills Park. These bathrooms will replace the facilities or porta-potties currently at the parks. The bathrooms are precast concrete and as such are designed to be easily cleaned and sanitized and are less susceptible to vandalism. The restrooms will be installed by the end of 2020.

September 15

City Council approved two preliminary plats. The first approval was for a 14-lot subdivision at 11020 N 5500 W. The second approval was for a 69-lot subdivision known as The Hollows located at 10360 N 6531 W. The updated Hollows development now includes a donation by the developer of the wetland property on the east side of the development to the City to be preserved in its natural state. A trail is planned to be built on the east side of the wetlands to allow public access for viewing. The respective developers will work with staff through the design and engineering process on their projects before coming back to Council for final plat approval.

The Council updated City Code to prohibit temporary signs from being placed on public property. This means that signs advertising businesses, political candidates, etc. can no longer be placed on City property including that on Alpine and Timpanogos property. All signs must now be placed on private property subject to permission by the property owner. Political signs may also to be placed on the park strip in front of an individual's home subject to the homeowner's approval. If a sign you own was placed on public property and removed, you can pick it up at City Hall up to one week after it was removed. Afterwards, it will be discarded.

Pressurized Irrigation Shut-off

Beginning on October 15, Public Works will begin draining and winterizing the pressurized irrigation (PI) system. While you may see water in the system after the 15, water pressure will diminish rapidly as ponds are drawn down. Winterize your system to prevent damage caused by frozen water left in pipes, sprinklers, filters, and valves. Don't forget to close your main valve, located in a box installed as part of your sprinkling system often in close proximity to the City's PI box. This will also help to protect your system from pressure fluctuations experienced when the system is charged in April. If you are unsure of how to winterize your system, please contact a landscape professional. For questions, contact Public Works at 801-772-4515.

Fire Safety Updates

Due to the extreme drought conditions and high fire danger, the State Forester has postponed the Fall 2020 open burn season. The US Forest service has also banned shooting in the foothills around American Fork Canyon. This includes firearms, air rifles and gas guns. Please help us protect life and property. This is also a good time to ensure that you have a clear fire perimeter around your property. We have seen how quickly fires can spread in these tinder dry conditions.

Highland City Cemetery Cleanup

Highland City seeks to offer families and friends that visit their loved ones resting in the cemetery a clean, beautiful, and peaceful environment. Please help us with this goal by keeping your site clean. The next cemetery decoration cleanup and removal will be on Monday, October 5. All perishable items will be discarded and all trinkets, shepherd-crooks, etc. will be removed and put in a storage facility on site. Items can be claimed Thursday, October 8 from 8:00 AM—5:00 PM. 2020 Election Information

Ballots will be mailed the week of October 12. If a voter does not have a ballot by October 16, they should contact the Utah County Elections Office at 801-851-8128. Dropbox locations, ballot pick-up locations, early voting, who/what is on the ballot, etc. can all be found at [UtahCounty.Vote](https://utahcounty.vote).

Voters are encouraged to return their voted ballot at any of the secured drop boxes located throughout the County including the one directly north of City Hall. The deadline to postmark your ballot is November 2, the day **BEFORE** Election Day. If you return your ballot at a post office, confirm that your ballot will be postmarked before Election Day. Early Voting is available on October 28 - 30, and November 2, at the Elections Office.

Ballot pick-up locations will be available on Election Day from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM and Utah laws permitting same-day registration via provisional ballots will be in effect.

Utahns will see judges on their ballots this November. Become informed at judges.utah.gov. This website is run by an independent government commission that provides judicial performance evaluations about every judge on your ballot.

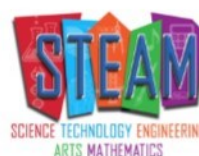
