Water Conservation Efforts

In order to stretch our water supply through the summer months, we all need to be water wise. Here are some tips from slowtheflow.org. See their website for rebates, current lawn water guides, and other tools for water conservation.

- Eliminating just one watering can save about 3,000 gallons for the average quarter-acre Utah yard with .17 acres of green space.
- Don't over-water your plants. More plants die from over-watering than under-watering. Drowning your vegetation will shorten its life.
- Adjust your mower height to a higher setting. Longer grass shades your root system and holds moisture for a healthier, greener lawn.
- Pull your weeds. They syphon water from health plants and shrubs. Fewer weeds means less water use for your landscape.
- Fix leaks. A leaky faucet can waste thousands of gallons of water and increase your water bill. Keep your plumbing updated and free of unnecessary leaks and drips.
- Add mulch to your garden. Organic mulch can help reduce evaporation around plants and shrubs. Use a drip irrigation system for less water waste and maximum effect.

Council Brief

May 4

City Council approved a bid for the 2021 Sewer Lining project for the Hidden Oaks Subdivision from Insituform in the amount of \$115,687.

The preliminary plat was approved for Sunrise Farms, a proposed 10-lot single family subdivision to be built by Patterson Development.

Council approved a purchase agreement of surplus property to WPI for development of a commercial retail building. The land is expected to improve access to and travel around the parking lot of Meier's, Fiiz, and other businesses in the area. Plans were discussed on how to reconfigure the parking lot and drive lanes to improve traffic flow and vehicle stacking.

May 18

Council voted to approve an increase in culinary water rates beginning July 1, 2021. This equates to a \$3.67 increase in the monthly residential base rate and overage rates will increase by 30%.

Council adopted changes to the Fences, Wall and Hedges section of the Highland City Development Code (Section 3-612). The changes determine how tall a fence sitting atop a retaining wall or berm may be. This applies to those seeking new fence or wall permits, but no changes need to be made to existing structures. The code changes also clarify fence height in front yards, on corner properties and in sight triangles at intersections, making it easier to understand and apply the requirements for all.

The RAP Tax process will continue. The RAP Tax item will be placed on the November 2021 ballot. This Recreation, Arts and Park Tax would raise money to fund local needs such as trails, Arts Council, and recreation programs. It would be 0.1% on eligible purchases. It was discussed that most of the surrounding cities already have such a tax in place to fund these programs in their cities.

Council determined that the proceeds from the sale of open space property would go into an open space capital account so that the funds raised in these transactions will still benefit open space neighborhoods. Councilmembers felt that this money should be used for maintenance and repairs in these designated open space neighborhoods.

Bids were reviewed for the 2021 Road Rehabilitation Projects and the contract was awarded to Black Forest Paving. Staff will work with Black Forest to complete these projects.

Public Hearing—Pressurized Irrigation Enterprise Fund

Tuesday, June 15, 7:00 PM at City Hall

The General Fund pays the Pressurized Irrigation (PI) Fund \$108,000 per year to water the approximately 179 acres of parks, park strip grass, and vegetation owned by the City. It is proposed that the PI Fund do a transfer of funds back into the General Fund in the amount of \$108,000 to make the General Fund whole for this cost. The purpose of this hearing is to notify the public of this proposal. The \$108,000 represents 3% of the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budgeted expenses of the PI Fund.

Quarterly Cemetery Clean Up

On Monday, June 14, 2021, ALL decorations will be cleared from the graves at the Highland City Cemetery, including real and artificial decorations, trinkets, ornaments, lamps, shepherd hooks, etc. Please remove all decorations from your loved ones' graves prior to this day. You are welcome to return decorations after the clean up has been completed.

Decorations of a more permanent nature which are not removed by the owner will be placed in a Conex container, on site, and will be held for one week. Owners may claim decorations by appointment only. Please call Stephannie at (801)772-4505. Thank you for helping maintain a clean, beautiful, and peaceful environment at the cemetery.

Be a Responsible Pet Owner

Raise your hand if you got a new pet during the quarantine. Here's a reminder for all pet owners. Please clean up pet waste when you are out walking in public areas. Our Parks Department has seen a major increase in pet messes, especially at Dry Creek Park and at the cemetery. Animals are not allowed in the cemetery except within a vehicle, per city code 13.48.190.

Please pick up after your animals. Do not leave plastic bags behind. Take them with you or dispose of them in garbage cans located in park pavilions. Do your duty when your dogs do theirs!

Candidate Filing Period

Highland City has the Mayoral seat, and two City Council seats open this election. Each seat is a 4-year term that begins January 1, 2022. The General Election is on Tuesday, November 2, 2021. If needed, a Primary Election will be Tuesday, August 10. Consider serving your community by running for office. Candidate filing period is Tuesday- Friday, June 1-4 and Monday, June 7, 2021. File a Declaration of Candidacy in person at City Hall between 8 AM and 5PM. Candidates must pay a \$35 filing fee, must be a registered voter, and must have resided in Highland for at least 12 consecutive months immediately before the election.

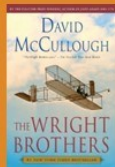
All the Light We Cannot See
