Mayor's Message

In October you will be receiving a ballot where you have the opportunity to vote for two city council members from the four candidates listed. They are asking for the privilege to spend five to twenty or more hours a week for four years making decisions that affect us now and years into the future.

Council members will make decisions on budgetary expenses totaling about \$90M over the course of their four-year term (+\$22M per year), zoning, park amenities, trails, road maintenance, and a variety of legal items.



Let me offer a few thoughts on personal characteristics that you can look for as you consider which candidates to support:

- They need to be someone whose judgement you can trust. Are they able to set aside self-interest when they vote? A council member will vote over 500 times during a four-year term. You can view all council votes since Jan 2018 here - <http://bit.ly/HC-CC-Voting-History>
- They will be making decisions on issues in areas where they are not experts. Look for someone who likes to learn, is willing to listen to multiple points of view, and is able to revise their opinion as they learn more about an issue.
- Council members often don't agree with each other, but need to work together. Can a candidate disagree without being disagreeable? Are they able to effectively debate issues? Can they compromise when that is called for?
- Residents will have strong opinions on issues and occasionally are unkind to those who don't agree. Showing civility in the face of incivility tends to de-escalate issues and helps take emotion out of decisions. Look for those who are gracious when others are not.
- Doing the right thing in the wrong way can generate a lot of negativity and is often worse than doing nothing. The "wrong way" usually means making big decisions in a way that is perceived to be non-transparent.
- Candidates that are patient and persistent will be able to move the ball forward on big issues.

Is there a perfect candidate? No. Are there candidates who are perfectly capable of doing an excellent job? Absolutely! Please take the time to get to know those who are running and support those you believe will be effective public servants over the next four years. Note, on September 17 we will celebrate the 234 anniversary of the signing of the US Constitution. Take a few minutes to review the Constitution and consider what steps you can take to help preserve it. Daniel Webster in 1832 had this to say about its importance:

"Other misfortunes may be borne, or their effects overcome. If disastrous war should sweep our commerce from the ocean, another generation may renew it; if it exhaust our treasury, future industry may replenish it; if it desolate and lay waste our fields, still, under a new cultivation, they will grow green again, and ripen to future harvests. ... But who shall reconstruct the fabric of a demolished government? Who shall rear again the well proportioned columns of constitutional liberty? Who shall frame together the skillful architecture which unites national sovereignty with state rights, individual security, and public prosperity?"

Drought Response Tips

Utah is still experiencing one of the worst droughts on record. To do our part, Highland City has asked residents to cut back on outdoor watering by 30%. Initially, the City wasn't seeing much reduction, but more recently residents have cut back and to this point, we've used 9% less water this year in comparison to previous years. This is a great start, but we can all do better.

The City is asking residents to conserve water not just because we're in a historic drought, but also because we don't know what this winter will bring. Highland water users are currently on track to use up a good portion of the City's pressurized irrigation stored water. This means that next year the only water for outdoor use we'll have is whatever we get over the winter. And if we have another bad winter and the severe drought continues next year, things will be even worse.

Please help us prepare and do your part and cut back watering by 30%. So, if you're watering for 30 minutes per station, cut it back to 20 minutes. When you do water, please remember to follow the watering schedule to ensure everyone has enough pressure to water so no drop is wasted:

- Even Addresses: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
- Odd Addresses: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
- No watering on Sunday
- Water from 6:00 pm on the assigned day to 10:00 am the following day

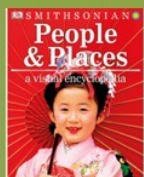

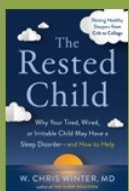

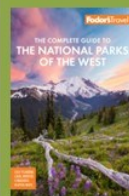

RESOURCE OF THE MONTH

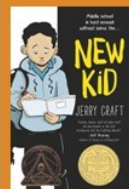

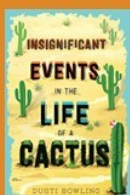
Kid's School Stories

2021 Municipal Elections

In November, registered voters will have the opportunity to vote for the Mayor's seat, two City Council seats, and two Propositions. A summary of each is outlined below. Prior to the election, the City will produce a Voter Information Pamphlet with more information that will be made available to all registered voters. More election information can be found at www.HighlandCity.org and www.UtahCounty.vote.

City Council and Mayor's Race

The top four candidates who will proceed to the general election in November to vie for the two open Council seats are as follows: Sarah D. Petersen, Jerry Abbott, Scott L. Smith, and Colby Gibson. In addition, the Mayor's seat will be on the ballot. The only candidate currently registered to run for that seat is Kurt Ostler.

The Highland Youth City Council will host a Candidate Debate on Thursday, October 7, 2021 at Highland City Hall. The event will include a meet and greet at 6:30 pm followed by a question-and-answer period at 7:00 pm. Residents may attend in person or remotely via the City's YouTube Channel. Please submit debate questions to events@highlandcity.org by Sunday, October 3.

Proposition 1 – Wimbledon Subdivision Open Space Disposal and Removal of Neighborhood Option Trail

On December 3, 2019, the Highland City Council approved the removal and sale of 5.77 acres of public open space property and 5,592 lineal feet of paved public trails located in and around the Wimbledon Subdivision (10030 North to 10250 North and 6690 West to 6580 West) to the neighboring residents. The sale will take place only if it is approved by the voters.

Proposition 11 - Highland City Sales and Use Tax for Parks and Trails

City Council has placed a special sales and use tax on the 2021 Municipal Ballot. If approved by voters, the tax would be a 0.1% sales tax collected at Highland businesses and the funds collected could only be spent on recreation facilities such as parks and trails. The sales tax rate means \$0.01 would be collected for every \$10 spent. The tax would only be implemented if it is approved by the voters.

Highland City will host a public meeting on Tuesday, October 12, 2021 at 7:00 pm at Highland City Hall on the topic of the sales and use tax for Parks and Trails. Residents may attend in person or via the City's YouTube Channel.

August 3

City Council approved the plat, site plan, and conditional use permit for three office buildings that will be located at approximately 11235 N Highland Boulevard. The developer will now work with staff on design and engineering before beginning construction.

City Council voted to place a Parks and Trails sales and use tax on the 2021 municipal ballot. See more information on the on the Parks and Trails Tax below.

August 17

The City Council and staff discussed park use and special event policies as it relates to the Highland Run Club. Staff will research and draft potential amendments to the policies to bring back to Council for further discussion.

The Council approved the final plat of Sunrise Farms. It will be a 10-lot subdivision located at approximately 11241 N 6000 W. Staff will now work with the developer on design and engineering before construction begins.

The Council approved the purchase of a digital radar speed sign and trailer. Once the City receives the trailer, staff will be able to take the trailer to different locations throughout the City where residents are concerned about speeding.

Council and staff discussed the gap in funding needed to complete the Mitchell Hollow Trail. Council directed staff to build the trail to the extent that funds would allow from north to south focusing on the area before the wetlands where a boardwalk is necessary. Staff will apply for grant money to complete the remainder of the trail.
