### 'Homemade Shoes' by Suzanne Mann

*"Come here, my darlings. Let me secure your feet! School is very far away, and the weather is frightfully cold today."*

*While sitting in his favorite chair, the dear father lovingly lifted his children, one at a time, onto his lap for the daily ritual of feet wrapping. First, he nestled their little toes into long strips of woolen fabric. Then, around and around the material went, until there was a nice, soft cushion to walk on. Next, to provide some protection from the frozen snow, a sizable piece of thick, stiff leather from a buffalo hide covered the wool. Finally, the whole package was tied up like a present with strong corded rope. A big hug with, "Thank you, Papa!" ceremoniously concluded each set.*

*The children then playfully stomped around the house wearing their clumsy and boxy homemade 'shoes' until it was time to leave for school. Across the room, still seated in front of the fireplace, this good father watched and wished he could afford real shoes for his young ones. He smiled anyway.*

*With breakfast and chores finished, the happy children started out into the chilly air, after being covered with woolen hats and coats and mittens, of course. Now, they would be warm- from head to toe!*

*No matter the weather, the Gailey family children walked four miles to school each day. Years later, John sold a cow, so he could buy his children their first pair of shoes. His eldest daughter was 14 years old at the time.*

## Council Brief

In each month's newsletter, we give a brief overview of some stand-out items from Council meetings. For full agendas, minutes, & audio, visit <http://bit.ly/HC-agendas>.

### November 9

Shauna Larson announced she is stepping down as the Arts Council Chair. She was honored for her 11 years of service on the Arts Council where she has been instrumental in building the numerous successful programs the Council operates today.

Phoebe Hall has graciously volunteered to be and was appointed as the new Chair of the Arts Council. If you are interested in getting involved with the Arts Council, email [events@highlandcity.org](mailto:events@highlandcity.org).

Council approved their 2022 meeting schedule. Meetings will generally be held the first and third Tuesday of the month with some exceptions. A full meeting schedule can be found on the City's website.

The Council approved the Final Plat for retail development at the Ridgeview subdivision. Costa Vida and Arby's will be the first two tenants. Council also approved the Preliminary Plat for Ridgeview Pod B. This will be an additional 424 units in the subdivision.

Council amended the short-term rental ordinance to require all new permitted properties be owner-occupied.

Council approved an ordinance governing shipping containers. See more on the column to the right.

City Council continued their previous discussion from June 15 regarding the remaining open space property disposal requests. Council voted to surplus 2 of the properties, not to surplus 2 others, and deferred the decision on the remainder for staff to do added research.

Council discussed the Open Space Financial Plan with the consultant hired to do the study. The study will include an analysis on the operational and capital costs of the fund, long term revenue projections, and financing plan and cost allocation between regular city park funds and the open space fund.

Council approved updates to Highland City Design Criteria to allow for xeriscaping in parkway detail.

Council discussed a recent MAG study regarding the recommendations for 4800 West improvements. Council will continue this conversation with residents and at future Council meetings before deciding whether to complete the suggested improvements.

The Mayor and Council directed staff to conduct research and provide recommendations for Wimbleton Open Space property in light of the election outcome.

## Election Results

The 2021 General Municipal Election was held on November 2, 2021. Congratulations to the following candidates who were elected: Mayor: Kurt Ostler; Council Members: Sarah D. Petersen and Scott L. Smith. Each elected official will serve a term of 4 years beginning on January 3, 2022 and ending on December 31, 2025.

Proposition #1 Wimbleton Subdivision Open Space Disposal was voted AGAINST with 65.95% of the voters. Proposition #11 Parks Tax was voted FOR with 62.26% of the voters.

## Christmas Tree Disposal

All Highland residents are invited to bring their live, unflocked and un-decorated Christmas trees to the dumpsters in the empty lot east of the Police Station from December 27—January 10. Place all trees in the dumpsters to be hauled away by Waste Management. No other items may be disposed of and trees can only be brought during the timeframe outlined.

## Shipping Container Ordinance

On November 9, the City Council passed an ordinance regulating the use of shipping containers. This new ordinance will *only* be applicable to shipping containers placed on residential properties *after* the ordinance was passed. The following is a short summary of the regulations:

- Must meet accessory structure regulations for the applicable zone
- Setbacks – front: 10' behind the front of the home; side: 10'; rear: 10'
- Design – shall be painted a color consistent with that of the home
- Height – may not be stacked vertically
- *Prohibited* on lots without a home





# Winter Weather Advisories

## Snow Reminders

The safety of Highland City residents during and after a snow event is a top priority for the City. Our Public Works department utilizes all available assets as needed to clear the roads depending on the storm event, snowfall received, and duration of the storm. Salt is used only at intersections and other problematic locations to provide traction.

## Snow Plowing Priority

Please see the attached map for street plowing priority. Priority is based on the road classification and usage intensity. Streets identified as arterial or collector roads, which are deemed to be in the minimum network needed to provide basic transportation for public safety, schools, or steep grades, receive priority. These streets will be plowed first and as frequently thereafter as needed. Priority streets are cleared 7 days a week when weather conditions warrant. When storm conditions have moderated, roads interior to subdivisions, including cul-de-sacs, will be plowed. It may take anywhere from 3 to 5 days after the storm before crews are able to clear all of these areas.

There are three traffic corridors within Highland that fall under the jurisdiction of the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT): SR-92 (Timpanogos Highway/Canyon Road), SR-74 (Alpine Highway), and SR-129 (North County Boulevard). Questions and concerns regarding these roads should be referred to the UDOT Region 3 offices at 801-227-8000.

## Street Parking

Street parking is prohibited from December 1 to March 31 between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. and any time snow is present to allow access to the plows for snow removal. The Police Department may issue parking citations or have vehicles towed that are parked on the street during or shortly after a snowstorm. Residents should also be mindful to keep all obstructions such as basketball hoops, trailers, trash cans, etc. off the streets during snow removal. These items create a hazard for our drivers and the adjacent persons and properties. Please remember, if you cannot see an item that is in the roadway and covered in snow, neither can we.

## Clearing Driveways

When snow is plowed, the resulting windrow flows to the side of the road including in front of mailboxes and into driveways. We understand that this is frustrating, however because our first priority is to clear the road and create a safe travel way, it is not an option to raise the plow blade at every drive approach. We ask for your understanding and cooperation. Clearing a 10-foot area of the oncoming lane shoulder may help.

## Sidewalk Clearing

Property owners should clear their sidewalks within 24 hours of a snowstorm. This helps ensure children can make it to school safely and keeps other pedestrians stay safe as well. Remember to push the snow onto your own property. Putting snow into the streets can make the road more dangerous for automobiles and snowplows. After the snow has been removed from the streets, Public Works employees will work to remove any snow from the walking trails and school sidewalk routes.

# Snow Plow Priority Map




Priority 1 - Arterial, Collector, or Schools
