

Mayor's Message

There is a lot to look forward to in the coming year, including:

Will our city face challenges this year? Absolutely. Will some of the issues come out of left field? Almost certainly. Will our elected officials and staff be able to deal with them? Yes, with your help and support they can accomplish almost anything. However, some issues take time to resolve.

Our new Mayor, Kurt Ostler, and the City Council are people we can get behind. They will serve us well. We can help them by providing information and sharing our perspectives. The City website has phone numbers for staff and elected officials. Call or arrange to meet with them.

Will mistakes be made during the year? Possibly, but consider this thought:

Now, let me share with you a few lessons I learned as mayor:

- **Assume good intent.** It leads to productive discussions, reduces tension, and more often than not, is the correct assumption.
- **City issues are usually more complex than we assume.** Be slow to judge.
- **Contention rarely, if ever, leads to positive outcomes.** Additionally, there are almost always negative side effects, such as damaged relationships, that can take years to resolve.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as your Mayor! I am a better person as a result. I have been blessed by your support, encouraging words, and uplifting notes. My best wishes to all in the coming years, as we work to build stronger families and improve our community.

Wreaths Across America Experience

On December 18, a Wreaths Across America Ceremony was held at the Highland City Cemetery in coordination with the Daughters of the American Revolution. Each branch of the military was separately acknowledged and honored with a wreath "in memory of those who served and are now serving."

Additionally, an eighth wreath was placed in honor of those from all branches who were Prisoners of War or Missing in Action. A final pledge was made: We shall not forget you. A new permanent *Never Forget Garden Marker* was dedicated to remember those who never returned to their families.

We invite you to visit these places of memorial and consider the sacrifices made to preserve our freedom and carry on the work of those who have gone before you. We hope that you will join us next December for the Wreaths Across America ceremony in Highland or another local cemetery, to honor and remember those whose gift to their nation—liberty—is one we enjoy every day.

Council Brief

December 7

Mayor Rod Mann presented his wife, Suzanne, with a certificate and pin for her individual years of service to the City and for supporting him in his role as Mayor.

Mayor Elect Kurt Ostler presented Mayor Mann with a recognition award and thanked him for his service to Highland City and its residents both as the Mayor and a City Council member.

Pressurized Irrigation staff gave an update on water storage status and conservation efforts. Overall, Highland residents used 17% less water this irrigation year in comparison to 2020. This is great news, but it's important to remember that conservation will still be important next year. The drought we are in is an historic drought and has been going on for decades. As such, it will take time to come out of it. Watch for additional information in Spring of 2022.

The Council adopted a change to the General Plan that discourages road connections from other municipalities that are not already planned for in Highland's master plans.

As a result of voters approving the Parks Tax, Council adopted the Parks Tax Ordinance. The special sales tax will take effect on April 1, 2022 and is expected to provide about \$150,000 in revenue annually that will go into a separate fund dedicated to park projects and equipment.

Council approved an amendment to a portion of the Site Plan for Highland Marketplace. The approved plan now has 8 buildings for office and retail space.

Snow Removal Reminders

The safety of Highland City residents during and after a snow event is a top priority for the City. Our Public Works department utilizes all available assets as needed to clear the roads depending on the storm event, snowfall received, and duration of the storm. Salt and sand are used only at intersections and other problematic locations to provide traction. Christmas Tree Drop-off

All Highland residents are invited to bring their live, unflocked, and un-decorated Christmas trees to the dumpsters in the empty lot east of the Police Station from December 27-January 10. Place all trees in the dumpsters which will be hauled away by Waste Management. No other items may be disposed of and trees can only be brought during the timeframe outlined.

Planning Commission Openings

The Planning Commission is an advisory board, making recommendations to City Council, balancing public and private interests, overseeing land use and more.
