Mayor's Message -From Kurt Ostler

Springtime for the City means looking at the amount of moisture received over the winter, preparing to start up the City's water pressurized irrigation system, and hiring temporary, seasonal employees. City parks department pays between \$14 to \$16 per hour and works Monday-Thursday if you know of anyone looking for a job. Over the coming weeks, the City will be evaluating expected water runoff and water reserves in the reservoirs. I would expect there will still need to be water conservation measures put in place, and one option is delaying the start of our city pressurized system until May 1.



In April, the reconstruction of 6800 West from 9600 North going south down by the Utah County Equestrian Park will begin with an estimated completion in late Fall. The plan is to have one lane going in each direction plus a center turn lane for safety.

Over the winter, the City has been working on several projects, including redrilling a City culinary well down to 1,200 feet. Most of the City's current culinary wells are at 600 feet; this new well depth will help with future culinary water needs, and our initial test shows it will be a high-performing well.

As mentioned in past City newsletters, our police and fire departments see extreme wage pressures to retain our great staff. The City Council and I have met with our Chiefs and reviewed next year's budget and funding request to maintain our public safety employees. As Elected Officials, we will be going line by line over the City budget to see where there might be areas of saving. As a City, we plan to have budget open houses, so residents who would like to ask questions, provide feedback, or offer solutions, will have time to engage and understand any tax or fee increase request.

During February and March, several issues were happening at Planning Commission and City Council meetings wherein 150+ individuals attended. I wanted to thank all those who engaged with the City Council, City Staff, and myself and the respectful nature of their communication.

Property Lines and Permits

With Spring upon us, many residents are planning on installing fences, adding a patio or pool, improving their landscape, and more. Before you begin any of these projects, remember to confirm your property lines and check to see whether you need a permit for the work. [Utah County Parcel Maps](#) is a great online resource that anyone can use to reference property boundaries. Checking your property lines ensures work only occurs on property you own rather than someone else's including the City's. 6800 West Reconstruction Project

A section of 6800 West, south of 9600 North will be reconstructed and widened this year. The work will consist of widening the roadway to include a center turn lane, bike lanes, and sidewalks on both sides of the street. Work will be taking place from March – December 2022. Council Brief

March 1

City Council gave architectural approval for Bank of America to remodel the building formerly operating as a Taco Time. After Bank of America receives a building permit, they will begin the construction process.

City Council voted to update City Code relating to animals and nuisances. The updates to Chapter 6 of the Municipal Code clarified when dog barking is considered a nuisance, limited the number of dogs and cats in each household to three a piece, and updated vaccination requirements to current standards.

March 15

City Council voted to keep 4800 West designated as a three-lane major collector road in the General Plan and not move forward with any widening projects at this time. Council also directed staff to continue to study the intersection at 4800 West and Timpanogos Highway for any potential, but less impactful improvements.

Council approved a road access agreement that will allow for an access from the Meier's shopping area to 5600 West. Staff is working through the purchase process. Afterwards, the owner of the commercial areas will construct the road.

City Council voted to update pavilion rental fees. See more on page 3.

Council selected a new playground to replace the old one at Highland Glen Park. The playground features a two-tiered slide tower, large climbing structure, and spinning structure. It will be installed between July and September.

City Open House

The annual Highland City Open House is scheduled for Thursday, May 5 from 5:00—8:00 PM at City Hall. Information will be available on the City's budget including potential fee increases, 2022 Road Projects, Mountain Ridge Park, the Arts Council, the Historical Society, trash collection, ways to get involved in volunteer committees, and more. There will also be interactive activities for kids. We hope to see all of Highland there!

Upcoming City Budget

You can't turn on the news without hearing a story about inflation. This City is experiencing this in its own budget in particular in utility budgets with construction prices and other service costs. In recent months, each capital project the City has bid out has come in over budget. The price for one recent sewer project came in more than \$1 million over what was expected. Further, service contracts such as with our garbage hauler, Waste Management, have an inflationary component. As such, the City is analyzing all utility rates to ensure they are keeping up with rising costs.

Another area the City is experiencing budget stress is in public safety wages. Finding and retaining quality police officers and fire fighters is becoming harder and harder to do. This is especially true when neighboring entities are increasing their fire and police wages by 10% or more. Having reliable public safety is a key goal for our City and meeting that goal will likely mean raising wages. After all, how can we ask our public safety personnel to take the risks they do to protect and help us if we aren't going to compensate them fairly. A large part of what Highland contributes to the Lone Peak Public Safety District comes from the Public Safety Fee, which may not be enough cover the cost of the increased wages.

The City is doing everything it can to cut costs and keep increases to residents minimal. We understand that City budgets are funded by our hard-working residents who are experiencing inflation in their own family budgets, and as such, we make every effort to use tax dollars judiciously and frugally. We would encourage residents to watch upcoming Council agendas to get informed about the budget. You can also come to the Budget Open House on Thursday, May 5 from 5:00-8:00 PM to learn more about the budget and talk to your Elected Officials.

Mountain Ridge Park

Mountain Ridge Park is a 17-acre parcel of property west of Mountain Ridge Junior High. The full park design includes an all-abilities playground, walking paths, restrooms and pavilions, 3 multi-use grass fields, and 8 pickleball courts. Construction will begin this spring to begin work on the park by improving the entrance by piping the ditch, putting in a sidewalk, and creating a parking lot. Contractors have also submitted designs for the playground and shortly the Council will ask for resident input to select the final design. 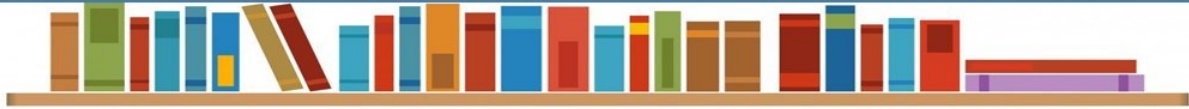

Water Once a Week

Spring is officially here, and temperatures are warming. Pressurized Irrigation water will be available for use by April 15. However, Highland City is asking all water users to please ease into watering this season. While we did see some snow this winter, our area only has about 80% of normal snowpack at this point. Due to the extremely low snow levels last season, a large amount of our reservoir water was used up, leaving less reservoir water for use this irrigation season.

So please, rather than automatically turning on your sprinkler clock to water three times a week like you'll need in the heat of the summer, only water as needed. One time per week or less is likely sufficient in April and early May (weather dependent). If water users use too much water in the early part of the season, our supply may be extremely limited at the later end of the hot summer when water is really needed.

An excellent resource to help determine how often to water is the Utah Division of Water's Weekly Watering Guide published at conservewater.utah.gov and on Facebook @[conservewater](https://www.facebook.com/conservewater). There you can also find other resources such as how to do your own water check on your sprinkler system, rebate programs for taking water conservation steps, waterwise landscaping, and how to "flip your strip" from grass to a water-wise strip.

Help Keep Our Gutters Clean

If you walk outside your home and glance at the curb and gutter, do you see a lot of leaves, mud, and other debris? Will you join in a community effort to clean the gutters adjacent to your property? Every fall and winter the gutters fill with leaves, mud, and debris that the street sweeper is unable to remove. This means that with April showers, some of this material eventually finds its way into the storm drain system and potentially even our ground water. Please help to keep the streets, gutters, and water resources clean.

Arbor Day Tree Planting & Sale

Our annual Tree Sale will be April 30 from 8 am - 2 pm on the corner of 10700 N. and 5400 W. April 30 is for Highland residents only. Bring proof of residency with you (ID, utility bill, etc). We accept all forms of payments. All trees are sold AS IS, with a maximum of 8 trees per resident/household. We cannot hold trees or take special orders. A list of trees for sale and their prices will be posted online at least one week before the Tree Sale. Prices and tree types subject to change without notice. Any leftover trees will be sold the following week on May 5 from 8AM-12PM (or earlier if sold out).


Celebrate Arbor Day with us at our annual Tree Planting on April 30 beginning at 8 am. Projects typically finish before noon. Location is TBD, please check the website, social media, or give us a call. Volunteers are encouraged to bring garden tools, drinking water, and work gloves. Please dress for the weather.
