

Mayor's Message — Kurt Ostler

This past year, the Utah State Legislature passed a law that requires the City to install secondary water meters on all homes by 2030. The state bill, H.B. 242, is in response to Utah's ongoing drought and to encourage water savings. When Saratoga Springs installed secondary meters in 2016, they saw a 27 percent drop in secondary water usage. Since 2018, Highland City has required all new homes to install a secondary water meter, approximately 250 homes. The cost for Highland City to install secondary meters on homes built before 2018 will be \$9.8 million dollars for 4,500 homes. The City has successfully obtained Federal Government and State of Utah grant money for \$7 million dollars. With \$2 million from the Bureau of Reclamation, WaterSMART grant, and \$5 million from the Division of Utah Water Resources, the remaining \$2.8 million coming from the Highland City Pressurized Irrigation Enterprise fund. Highland's average lot size is 0.6 acres, with about 0.3 acres irrigated by Highland's secondary water system. Highland City is expecting once the meters are installed, and residents become aware of their secondary water usage, the City will save about 3,750 acre-feet of secondary water annually.



Fiber Internet

As many residents have probably seen on social media or in local news, our neighboring cities, Lehi, Cedar Hills, and American Fork, are looking at or have already signed contracts to bring fiber internet to their cities. Based on Highland residents' responses from our annual city survey and questions asking specifically about fiber internet, it appears Highland residents also want a fiber internet option. Over the past several months, the Mayor and City Council have sought out and discussed the City's internet options with several fiber internet providers. In these discussions, the Mayor and City Council have wanted the free market to provide fiber internet throughout the City without a City commitment. However, based on discussions with several fiber internet providers, it seems to be a long shot at having them provide city-wide fiber unless the City gets involved. One of the top fiber providers in Utah County is UTOPIA fiber. To help evaluate fiber options, the Mayor and City Council will have UTOPIA do a presentation at the upcoming Tuesday, October 4th, 2022, City Council meeting

City Council Brief

September 6

The Mayor and City Council discussed the phasing plans and revenue sources for the park next to Mountain Ridge Junior High. Council approved moving ahead with finishing the parking lot and street improvements, playground area, basketball and pickleball courts, a baseball field, and grass area south of the playground. The City is partnering with the Highland Foundation to fundraise to finish the remaining areas of the park. More information is on page 1.

The Council directed staff to create a monarch butterfly way station in Highland Glen Park by planting some milkweed as a part of a remediation project. Staff will begin working on the project shortly and expect to have it complete Spring of 2023.

Staff reported that UDOT is making plans to place a traffic signal at the intersection of Knight Avenue and North County Boulevard. The project is still in the design phase and next will go out to bid for a contractor.

September 20

The City Council approved the final Ridgeview Plats I, J, and the Park. The plats provide for 40 additional lots and a park south of Lone Peak High School.

City Council discussed a potential private-public partnership with Surf Soccer Club. Surf is proposing donating \$200,000 towards Mountain Ridge Park in exchange for being allowed exclusive use of competitive teams at the Lone Peak fields for the next 11 years. The Club would also maintain the fields during that time. Council asked staff to work with Surf to finalize details and bring back a formal agreement for their consideration.

The Site Plan for a new office building located at approximately 10806 N 5400 W was approved. The developer will now work with staff on their final plans before beginning construction.

City Council clarified a few items in relation to fireworks and fires. The firework restriction map was updated to include all City-owned parks and trails. In addition, Council clarified that homes in firework-restricted areas are also restricted from conducting an Open Burn to dispose of yard-type waste. Further, the only fires that are allowed in City parks are in equipment the City has put in and maintains such as BBQ grills and fire pits. Recreational fires for things such as roasting marshmallows are allowed on all privately-owned land assuming they meet safety criteria.

Credit & Debit Card Fees

On November 1, the City will begin accepting credit and debit card payments for a broader range of transactions including building permits and other fees. In anticipation of this change, the City Council approved a convenience fee that will cover the cost the City incurs when accepting card payments. The amount of the fee depends on the transaction, and will generally be 2.25% to 3% of the transaction amount. The City will continue to accept payments via other methods without a convenience fee, including checks and electronic payments authorized directly from a checking account. While many other businesses often increase their prices across the board to compensate for credit card processing charges, the Council felt the convenience fee is the fairest way to pay for the ability to provide this payment method. Please note that the new convenience fee will not apply to utility payments.

Cemetery Clean-Up

On Monday, October 3, 2022, the cemetery will be cleared of ALL grave decorations, real or artificial, including trinkets, ornaments, etc. Items which appear to be of a permanent nature will be placed in a Conex container located on the southeast corner of the cemetery. Owners may claim these items by appointment. Items left unclaimed after one week will be discarded. Please make every effort to remove items from your loved one's grave prior to the cleanup. Pressurized Irrigation Shut-Off

On October 15, pressurized irrigation (PI) systems will be drained and winterized. While you may see water in the system after the 15, water pressure will diminish rapidly as ponds are drawn down. Winterize your system to prevent damage caused by frozen water left in pipes, sprinklers, filters, and valves. Close your main valve, located in a box installed as part of your sprinkling system. This will also help to protect your system from pressure fluctuations experienced when the system is charged in April. For questions, contact Public Works at (801)772-4515.
