

## Mayor's Message — Kurt Ostler

Thank you for all the hard work of our City's snowplow drivers and parks department in clearing city roads and sidewalks over the past several months. For the big storm on Wednesday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, Highland City's six snowplow drivers started at 3:30 am to plow all the roads in the city. With blowing snow, a job that usually takes 5 to 7 hours to plow all the city roads ended up being a 14-hour day.



Over the past several months, different issues have been brought before the mayor and city council. Several residents have come to city council meetings or sent e-mails with concerns about speed, traffic, and businesses operating in residential zones.

To address the traffic issues, the city has engaged a traffic engineering company to develop a "Traffic Tool Box" to help the city council determine correct speeds on Highland Roads and different traffic calming options.

About home-based businesses, the city has been working with several home-based business owners who have outgrown the intent of the Highland residential business code. The City Council has been working with the home-based business owners who need to relocate from their homes to find a more retail or commercial/warehouse location.

The construction of Mountain Ridge Park has started, and residents will start to see the park come together over the following months.

## Upcoming City Budget

City Staff are hard at work preparing next year's City budget for Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24) which will start July 1, 2023 and run through June 30, 2024.

The top budget priorities the Council has set for next year include: eliminating the Open Space Fee, construction of the Parks Maintenance Building, updating the General Plan, and adding extra funding for the maintenance of the soon to be constructed Mountain Ridge Park. (See last month's newsletter for a detailed discussion on the Open Space Fee.)

As was discussed last month, there is also currently a court case pending in the Utah Supreme Court whose outcome could have implications on Highland's Road Fee and Public Safety Fee. The City continues watching for the outcome of this case to see how this might impact our City budget.

Staff plans to present a draft of the preliminary budget to City Council on Thursday, March 30 at 6:00PM. ## City Council Brief

### February 7

The City Council voted to allow Alpine Food Storage to continue operation at their current location until June 30. The owners are in the process of moving their business to a commercial facility in American Fork and plan to be moved prior to the deadline.

The Council approved a contract with Hydro Vac for the installation of Pressurized Irrigation (PI) meters throughout the City this summer. The meter installations are state mandated and the City has received approximately \$7 million in grant money to help with the project. Watch for more information coming on this project shortly.

Council directed staff to continue working on plans for a new parks maintenance building to be constructed north of the community center. Plans and bids will be brought back to Council at a future time for final approval.

### February 21

City Council met with the company who is developing the City's Traffic Calming Toolbox. This tool will establish a process for the City to address resident concerns of pedestrian safety, speeding issues, and the like.

City Council approved an agreement with a donor who is contributing \$500,000 towards the all-abilities playground at Mountain Ridge Park. Construction on the park is ongoing and plans are for phase 1 of the park to open this summer.

## 2023 Elections

Consider Serving your Community by running for office! Highland City will have three City Council seats open this election. Each seat is a 4-year term that will begin January 1, 2024.

The candidate filing period is June 1-2 and June 5-7. Those wishing to run for office must file a Declaration of Candidacy in person with the City Recorder at 5400 West Civic Center Drive, Highland, UT between the hours of 8:00 am and 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Candidates must also pay a \$35 filing fee.

Candidates must be a registered voter and have been a resident of Highland for at least 12 consecutive months immediately before the election. Watch for additional information in upcoming newsletters.

## Cemetery Cleanup

Highland City seeks to offer a clean, beautiful, and peaceful environment for those visiting their loved ones resting in the cemetery. Please help us with this goal by keeping your site clean.

On Monday, March 6th, the cemetery will be cleared of ALL grave decorations, real or artificial, including trinkets, ornaments, lamps, shepherd hooks, etc. Items which appear to be of a more permanent nature will be placed in a Conex container located on the southeast corner of the cemetery. Owners may claim these items by appointment only by calling (801) 772-4505. Items left unclaimed after one week will be discarded. Please make every effort to remove items from your loved one's grave prior to the cleanup. For questions, please call (801) 772-4505.

Cemetery cleanups are held on the 1st Monday in March, 2nd Monday in June, the 1st Monday October, and the 1st Monday in December.



## Pressurized Irrigation

Pressurized irrigation water will be ready for use by April 15. As the process to bring the system online takes 7-10 days, Public Works will begin recharging the system around April 1. Please make sure your stop and waste valves are shut off while the system is being loaded. If valves are not shut off, flooding may occur. Once the system is fully operational on April 15, individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

While we have experienced a robust snowpack this past winter season, conservation of this vital resource should always be in the forefront of our mind seeing as we don't know what future years will look like in regard to water availability. As you look at the landscaping in your yard, we encourage you to choose drought tolerant plants and consider the use of attractive xeriscape alternatives.

Water conservation is critical, especially because past studies have shown that Highland residents use almost double the amount of water necessary for outdoor watering. Thank you for helping us conserve water!
