Thank you to all those who filled out the city alcohol survey. The survey results showed that 62% of Highland residents who filled out the survey supported allowing alcohol to be served in Highland restaurants. I anticipate the city council to vote on the alcohol code change in January 2024.

On November 22, 2023 we finally had the grand opening for the city's new park over by Mountain Ridge Junior High. The park property was purchased in 2008 through a park bond, then design started in 2018, and finally, after a lot of work, Phase One has just been completed. Depending on funding, the city anticipates finishing Phase Two this summer with

two sports fields, a baseball field, a trail around the park. Funding for phase one park amenities has come from generous donations, city property sales, Federal COVID relief funds, Highland Parks tax, impact fees, and city general funds.

I hope the new park will be a place where families can bond, children play, and friendships are nurtured, and the mayor wins anyone playing pickleball against him. This beautiful park stands as a testament to the dedication and hard work of many individuals in our community. Thank you to the residents of Highland and the generous donors for making this park happen.

Street Parking

Street parking is prohibited from December 1 to March 31 between the hours of 12:00 and 8:00 a.m. and any time snow is present to allow access to the plows for snow removal. The Police Department may issue parking citations or have vehicles towed that are parked on the street during or shortly after a snowstorm. **Streets with cars parked or other obstructions may not be cleared until items are removed.**

Residents should also be mindful to keep all obstructions such as basketball hoops, trailers, trash cans, etc. off the streets during snow removal. These items create a hazard for our drivers and the adjacent persons and properties. Please remember, if you cannot see an item in the roadway and covered in snow, neither can we.

PI Meter Winter Update As we enter phase 2 of PI meter installations this winter, we have a couple reminders for our residents:

- Please make sure the sprinkler system shut off valve in your service box is turned off after the meter installation (handle should be perpendicular to the pipe)
- The 60-day landscaping warranty will start May 1st for all homes that had a meter installed after October 1st.

No Grease in the Drain

Around the Holiday season, our Public Works Department sees a large amount of grease running through our systems that has been put down the drain. Grease is dangerous for our sewer system as it sticks to other things that have been flushed and can cause a congealed mass of grease and other material which can ultimately lead to sewer backups. Please do yourself and all your neighbors a favor and put your grease in the garbage can instead of down the drain.



Snow Plow Priority Map



Snow Plowing Priority

Please see the attached map for street plowing priority. Priority is based on the road classification and usage intensity. Streets identified as arterial or collector roads, which are deemed to be in the minimum network needed to provide basic transportation for public safety, schools, or steep grades, receive priority. These streets will be plowed first and as frequently thereafter as needed. Priority streets are cleared 7 days a week when weather conditions warrant. When storm conditions have moderated, roads interior to subdivisions, including cul-de-sacs, will be plowed. It may take anywhere from 3 to 5 days after the storm before crews are able to clear all of these areas.

There are three traffic corridors within Highland that fall under the jurisdiction of the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT): Timpanogos Highway(SR-92), Alpine Highway(SR-74), and North County Boulevard(SR-129).
