

Mayor's Message - Kurt Ostler



Reflecting upon the city events and projects completed for 2023, it was a busy year. We started the year with our fantastic city's snow plow drivers working long hours clearing city roads; the heavy snowfall produced flooding and an all-out city flood preparation (thank you to all those who helped).

The city had several successful events, including the Easter egg hunt, senior

dinner, Trick or Treat Street, Christmas tree lighting, Santa Claus Coming to Town, and Highland Fling week-long events. The Library implemented new software, did plays, kids' story times, and several other events during the year.

The city council and staff stayed busy finishing up the 6800 West road widening and other road, sewer, water, and significant well projects (the city obtained a \$1 million grant for the significant well project). City Council also approved a new traffic toolbox to help with traffic calming measures on city streets and neighborhoods, hired a city communication specialist, implemented Yoppify (the city's new communication tool), passed a balanced budget without additional debt, and paid down bond debt. The city worked with Lone Peak Public Safety, police, and fire departments to address staffing and wage needs. With a lot of city staff's help, the city redid the playground and trail at Highland Glen Park. Completed phase one of the new 17-acre park by Mtn Ridge Junior High without any new debt. The city had several meetings and open houses and sent out a survey to collect feedback from every household on the city's alcohol ordinance.

Later in the year, the city replaced two city council members, Sarah Peterson and Tim Ball, who moved out of the city. Thank you to Sarah and Tim for their excellent service. As a city, we welcomed Ron Campbell, John Lefrandt (serving until the end of 2023), and Doug Courtney (starting service in 2024) as new city council members.

City Codes

Did you know Highland City Code requires permits to finish a basement, put in a fence, build a shed larger than 200 square feet, install a pool, and complete some remodels? These codes are in place to ensure the safety and aesthetic beauty of Highland now and for years to come. Do you have one of these projects planned? Email planning@highlandcity.org and staff will be happy to walk through the permitting process.

PI Meter Winter Update As we enter phase 2 of PI meter installations this winter, we have a couple reminders for our residents:

- Please make sure the sprinkler system shut off valve in your service box is turned off after the meter installation (handle should be perpendicular to the pipe)
- The 60-day landscaping warranty will start May 1st for all homes that had a meter installed after October 1st.
- We will be sending you a text through Yoppify a couple days before Hydrovac is scheduled to come install your PI meter. (please see the front page of the newsletter to sign up for Yoppify)
- If you have trees, shrubs, bushes, etc. that are too close to the PI box, they need to be trimmed enough to allow access to meter. We would prefer the homeowner take care of this. If not, Hydrovac will trim them for you.

Youth Council Wrap Up This year our Highland City Youth Council held a service project to gather new hats, scarves, and mittens for elementary aged kids in need of these items. Our Youth Council was able to gather 28 new coats, 46 pairs of new gloves/mittens, 16 warm scarves, and 27 hats/beanies. We are very grateful to our Highland residents for supporting our Gift of Warmth project. On Tuesday the 19th we are happy to report that the items donated were delivered. We'd like to give a shout out to Arby's for their generous partnership in helping make this project a possibility.

Street Parking Street parking is prohibited from December 1 to March 31 between the hours of 12:00 and 8:00 a.m. and any time snow is present to allow access to the plows for snow removal. The Police Department may issue parking citations or have vehicles towed that are parked on the street during or shortly after a snowstorm. **Streets with cars parked or other obstructions may not be cleared until items are removed.**

Residents should also be mindful to keep all obstructions such as basketball hoops, trailers, trash cans, etc. off the streets during snow removal. These items create a hazard for our drivers and the adjacent persons and properties. Please remember, if you cannot see an item in the roadway and covered in snow, neither can we.

SERVICE GUIDELINES

- Place your WM recycling and trash carts at the curb by 6 a.m. -- wheels facing the curb.
- Place carts at least 3 feet from other objects such as cars, mailboxes, trees and other carts.
- Ensure all material fits inside your carts with the lids fully closed. Be sure to break down cardboard boxes.
- Do not leave any materials next to or outside your cart. Excess materials will not be collected.
- For questions about what is accepted in recycling visit wm.com/RecycleRight.
- Check for weather-related delays at wm.com/us/en/mywm/notifications.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

Holidays that may be observed by the WM team servicing your residence are noted with a blue square in the calendar.

To confirm your schedule for any given holiday, visit: wm.com/us/en/mywm/locate.

If your service day falls on or after an observed holiday, your service that week may be delayed by one day. Regular service resumes the following week.

RECYCLING COLLECTION SCHEDULE: To confirm your collection day and whether your recycling collection week is Green or Gold, visit wm.com and select VIEW SCHEDULE in the top navigation bar. Enter your Service Address and click Verify. Or select the chat icon in the bottom corner and message an agent.
