## Mayors Message - Kurt Ostler

With over 84,000 students, the Alpine School District (ASD) is the largest school district in Utah and is growing rapidly. On April 29, 2024, Highland City Council voted along with Alpine, Cedar Hills, Lehi City, American Fork and Draper Cities to start the process into looking into forming a new school district (Central District). Eagle Mountain, Saratoga, Fairfield, and Cedar Fort Cities also voted on the same day to start the process of creating a separate school district (West District). This could ultimately split the current Alpine School District into three separate school districts.



To help evaluate the financial feasibility of a new Central District, the six cities hired LRB Public Finance Advisors of Utah (LRB) to conduct a study. The study looked at the fiscal impacts of a potential new school district, including start-up costs, capital facilities, and staffing. It also takes an in-depth look at student enrollment growth and revenue projections from federal, state, and local sources. On June 18, 2024, a presentation was given to all six Central District cities, wherein LRB presented the financial viability information. The study determined that the Central School District would be a financially viable option.

At the regular City Council meetings on July 2 and July 16, Highland will have public hearings to hear from residents to receive feedback on the proposal to form a new Central School District. If the Highland City Council votes to move forward with the other Central District cities, the new school district formation proposal will go to the voters and be on the November 2024 ballot.

Our top priority in evaluating the potential new school district is ensuring our children have the best education. Some residents have expressed concern about how this affects the current Alpine School District teachers, administrators, and other staff. Please know as decisions are being made to place the school district split on the November ballot, all the above factors and, future financial implications, along with better local school district representation will be taken into consideration.

### June 4, 2024

Council approved a \$0.35 increase to the garbage and recycling rates. The new rates will be \$11.33 for the first can and \$8.07 for additional cans. Recycling is \$7.53 per can. If you have two garbage cans and one recycling can at your home, your monthly bill will increase by \$1.05.

Council awarded the construction of the Park Maintenance Building. The new building will be north of the Community Center. Construction will be imminently underway and is expected to be complete Spring 2025.

The Council amended City code related to short-term rentals including allowing for one-night rentals and requiring the property to be owner occupied at the time of the rental. To obtain a short-term rental license, please visit [www.highlandcity.org](http://www.highlandcity.org).

### June 18, 2024

City Council approved a number of items related to the FY2025 budget that will begin July 2024. Council also approved final budget adjustments for FY2024 that ends June 2024.

Council approved purchasing new radio meters for the City's culinary water system that will be read from a tower in the City and allow residents to see their real-time water usage online. These are the same type of radios that will be in all of the pressurized irrigation meters.

## PI Watering Schedule

- ♦ If your house number ends in an **EVEN** number: your watering days are Monday, Wednesday and Friday
- ♦ If your house number ends in an **ODD** number: your watering days are Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday

No watering allowed on Sundays except for City, Churches and Schools. This schedule helps our system run smoothly and ensures everyone has enough pressure to water.

**E-Bike Safety** As the weather starts to get warmer, Highland City encourages residents to prioritize safety when using e-bikes. Please familiarize yourself with the rules and regulations, and educate others, including children, on their importance.

**All electric assisted bicycles (e-bike) must:**

- Not exceed 750 watts
  - A 750 watt fat tire e-bike can travel at speeds up to 20 mph
  - Have fully operable pedals on permanently affixed cranks
  - Be fully operable as a bicycle without the use of the electric motor
- Anyone under 16 years old may not operate a class 3 electric bike
- Anyone under 14 years old may not operate an e-bike unless the individual is under the direct supervision of the individual's parent or guardian
- Anyone under 8 years old may not operate an e-bike
- E-bikes are subject to the same provisions and regulations as bicycles
- Carrying more people than design permits is prohibited
- Bike helmets should always be worn

## Recycling Benefits

In April 2024, Highland recycled 61 tons of bottles, cans, paper and cardboard! This saved:

- **993 Mature Trees**—Enough avoided timber resource to produce 16,886,700 sheets of paper
- **142 Cubic Yards of Landfill Airspace**—Enough avoided airspace to fulfil the annual municipal waste disposal needs for 181 people!
- **190,550 Kwh of Electricity**—Enough avoided power use to fulfill the annual electricity needs of 17 homes!
- **Avoided 197 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions**—This reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 42 cars!
- **242,384 Gallons of Water!**—Enough water to meet the needs of 3,231 people

## Firework Restrictions

For the month of July, state law allows fireworks to be shot from July 2 to July 5 and July 22 to July 25 from 11:00 am - 11:00 pm except on July 4 and July 24 where hours extend to midnight.

Due to fire danger, fireworks are prohibited in certain areas of Highland including many subdivisions.

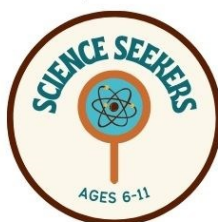
