## Mayor's Message - Kurt Ostler

On August 8, 2024, officers from the Lone Peak and American Fork Police Departments, along with a courageous local resident, Landon Waldvael, helped rescue a young driver trapped in a burning vehicle off of Canal Blvd.

The accident began shortly after midnight when Officer Austin Williams of the Lone Peak Police was driving home after his shift. Officer Williams noticed a vehicle speeding, traveling at more than 60-mph in a 30-mph zone. As Williams attempted to conduct a traffic stop, the vehicle disappeared from sight after running a red light. He soon discovered the vehicle had crashed into a tree and had caught fire.

Dashcam footage from Officer Williams shows him breaking the driver's side window to provide the trapped juvenile driver with air and attempting to rescue the driver. Despite his efforts, the damage to the vehicle made it impossible to free the driver.

Backup arrived quickly, with Officers Zach Goodale, Jordan McOmie, and McKay Valadez from the American Fork Police Department and Officer Dakota Kinser from Lone Peak Police joining the effort. The body camera video shows officers using their fire extinguishers but being unable to extinguish the car fire. Local resident Landon Waldvael helped out by running a 5-gallon bucket of water back and forth from a nearby home.

After several attempts to pull on the car door by the officers, and with the use of a tow rope, officers were able to open the door, pulling the young person from the car, thus saving this young person's life.

As evidenced by the rescue on August 8, 2024, and by Safewise.com naming Lone Peak area (Highland and Alpine) the #1 safest cities in Utah for 2024.

We have pretty fantastic neighboring and local police departments in the area, as well as local residents willing to step in to help. I would like to thank all 22 amazing Lone Peak Police officers for making Highland a safe place to live.

### October 15, 2024

- Library Updates:** The Highland City Library has seen big improvements, including new carpet, movable shelves, and fresh paint! Library Director Donna Cardon shared that 62% of Highland households have library cards. Looking ahead, the library plans to buy new furniture and may join the Timpanogos Library Consortium to offer even more books and resources.
- Sewer Rates Under Review:** Consultant Fred Philpot, of LRB Public Finance Advisors, shared their study on the city's sewer fund and proposed a sewer rate increase needed to cover higher charges from Timpanogos Special Service District. The Council asked for options to reduce the impact on residents. Updates will be shared in November and December.
- Public Works Projects:** The Council awarded Baker Construction the contract to complete the Hogs Hollow drainage improvements in 2024. The Council also approved a pressure reducing valve (PRV) installation project with Noland and Son Construction Co Inc. to reduce high water pressure in southwest Highland.

## 2024 General Election

The 2024 General Election is on Tuesday, November 5, 2024. Here's everything you need to know to vote:

### How and When Can I Vote?

**In-Person Voting:** Highland City's Voting Center will be open on Election Day from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

**Ballot Drop Box:** Drop off your ballot at the box located on the north side of City Hall (by the utility and library drop boxes). It will be open from October 15th to November 5th at 8:00 PM.

**By Mail:** If you're mailing your ballot, it must be postmarked by November 4th.

### How Do I Register to Vote?

The deadline to register online was October 25th.

If you missed the deadline, you can register at an early voting location or on Election Day, but you'll need two forms of ID.

**Street Parking** From December 1 to March 31, parking on the street is not allowed between 12:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., and any time there is snow. This rule helps ensure snow plows can clear the roads effectively. If you park on the street during a snowstorm or soon after, the Police Department may give you a ticket or have your vehicle towed. Streets blocked by parked cars or other items won't be cleared until everything is moved. Other items include: Basketball hoops, trailers, and trash cans.

These items can be dangerous for drivers and can cause issues during snow removal. Thank you for helping keep our streets safe!
