Mayor's Message - Kurt Ostler

As we prepare for the wintry season, the city's snow plow drivers have vision of snowy roads and rising early in the morning to ensure Highland roads are cleared and salted. The city has two teams of five drivers each that tackle the snowy roads when it snows. With seven plow trucks, the city plows about 100 miles of roads. Clearing all the streets in Highland takes about 8 to 12 hours. It's not uncommon for our snow plow drivers to be up late in the night or start early in the morning to clear the roads. The city goes through about 125 tons of salt per storm. Annually, we spend about 200 to 300 hours plowing roads; on average, we use about 1200 tons of salt.



Our parks department handles the city trails, with two Kabotas with plow attachments, snow blowers and shovels. Our parks department clears about 26 miles of trails. Trails are maintained during business hours, Monday through Thursday, and the city doesn't generally work overtime for snow removal on trails. It takes one full day to get through all 26 miles of trails and remove the snow. Utah County maintains the Murdock Trails.

Enjoy this fun poem to honor our snowplow drivers:

*Through sleepless streets the snowplow roars,
It's blade a beacon, its engine soars.
Beneath its might, the drifts retreat,
Carving paths through the icy streets.*

*Neon lights bounce off the snow,
Urban canyons in winter's glow.
Tires churn where silence lay,
The city wakes to a clearer day.*

*No glory waits, no crowds applaud,
But every cleared and salted road,
Is proof of hands that work unseen,
To keep our lives and paths serene.*

- **Highland Farmer's Market:** Heather Heras shared a recap of the 2024 Farmer's Market, highlighting strong vendor participation and financial stability.
- **Interlocal Agreement with Cedar Hills:** Passed to provide mutual building inspection services when needed.
- **Election Results:** Prop 11, creating a new school district, passed with 57.61% approval. Next steps include naming the district and electing board members.
- **Alpine Highway Fence Program:** A grant program for fence replacement is underway, with fees and conditions discussed.
- **Planned Development Zone Changes:** The Council voted 3-2 to remove the requirement for commercial uses in Planned Development (PD) zones

Christmas Tree Disposal Service - Easy & Eco Friendly

The holiday season is a time for celebration & joy, but once the festivities are over, it's time to think about taking down the tree. If you're looking for a hassle-free & environmentally-friendly way to dispose of your Christmas tree, look no further because we've got you covered!

When and Where: You can drop off your live Christmas tree for disposal from **December 27th to January 9th** at the **empty lot east of the Lone Peak Police Station**. It's a simple and convenient way to properly dispose of your tree without worrying about curbside collection

Date Range: December 27th - January 9th

Location: Empty lot east of the **Lone Peak Police Station**

Hours: Any time of day

Before you bring your tree, please remember to **remove all ornaments, tinsel, lights, and tree stands**. This ensures the tree is ready for recycling and properly processed.

Disposing of your Christmas tree in a responsible way helps keep our community clean and supports **eco-friendly recycling efforts**. Once collected, the trees will be turned into mulch and compost, keeping waste out of landfills.

Public Works Updates: PI Water Off for the Season

Our Public Works team has officially turned off the Pressurized Irrigation (PI) water for the season. The system will remain off until April 15th, allowing us to conserve resources and protect the infrastructure through the winter.

Now is also a great time to winterize your irrigation systems to prevent any damage from freezing temperatures. Additionally, with the leaves falling fast, remember to bag your leaves and dispose of them properly.

Street Parking From **December 1 to March 31**, you **cannot park on the street** between **12:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m.**, or whenever it snows. This rule helps snow plows clear the roads.

If you park on the street during a snowstorm or right after, the **Police Department** may give you a ticket or tow your car. Streets blocked by parked cars or other items will not be cleared until everything is moved.

Other items that should be moved include **basketball hoops, trailers, and trash cans**. These can be dangerous for drivers and get in the way of snow removal.

Thank you for helping keep our streets safe!

Snow Plow Information When snow is plowed, the resulting windrow flows to the side of the road including in front of mailboxes and into driveways. We understand that this is extremely frustrating to our residents.

Because our first priority is to clear the road and create a safe travel way, it is not an option to raise the plow blade at every drive approach.
