## Mayor's Message - Kurt Ostler

Over the past couple of months, I've visited with several residents who came to the City with legitimate concerns—issues such as property damage, crime, or persistent code violations in their neighborhoods. In each case, these individuals began as victims or concerned citizens simply trying to do the right thing. Unfortunately, however, some of these situations escalated in ways that ultimately required police involvement—and in a few cases, the roles became reversed, with the original complainant becoming the one in trouble.



I understand how frustrating it can be when problems linger without resolution. When you feel unheard or when issues drag on for weeks or months, emotions can understandably boil over. And yet, how we respond matters just as much—if not more—than the problem itself.

In each of these visits, I felt the sincerity and goodness in the hearts of our residents. Their frustrations were real, and their concerns were valid. That's why I want to share a few reminders that may help guide our actions if you ever find yourself in a similar situation:

## Code Compliance Issue:

- **Document everything:** Take photos and note dates, times, and how often the issue occurs.
- **Call our Code Compliance Office:** Once reported, be patient. Some violations take time to resolve—especially when the city is working with individuals on improvement plans.
- **Avoid confrontation:** Let the process work. We aim for resolution, not retaliation.

## If You Believe a Crime Has Been Committed:

- **Contact the police immediately:** Let law enforcement evaluate the situation and determine the appropriate response.
- **Don't take justice into your own hands:** Escalation rarely leads to resolution and can complicate your ability to get help.
- **Remember:** Seek justice, not revenge.

We are a strong and caring community. I've seen firsthand the patience, concern, and commitment of Highland's residents. My request is simple: when emotions run high, take a breath. Take a step back. Let us help.

Together, we can address the issues—safely, respectfully, and with dignity.

### June 3, 2025

**Trailer Parking Ordinance:** The Council updated the code to clarify that trailers, boats, travel trailers, and the like can not park in the same street block for longer than 48 hours.

### June 17, 2025

**FY26 Budget & Fraud Risk Assessment:** The FY26 Budget that begins July 1 was approved by Council. This approval also includes the transfer of \$108,000 from the Pressurized Irrigation Fund to the General Fund. As a part of the budget process, Highland completed the State Auditor's Office Fraud Risk Assessment and received a "low fraud risk" score.

### Election Information

Highland City will hold a Primary Election on Tuesday, August 12<sup>th</sup>, 2025, for City Council seats to narrow the field to four candidates. Ballots will be mailed to all registered voters starting July 22<sup>nd</sup> and must be received by 8:00 p.m. on August 12<sup>th</sup>. To ensure your ballot is received on time, please use the ballot drop box located on the north side of City Hall. There will be a Vote Center located at Highland City Hall from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on election day. The Mayoral seat will be included in the General Election to be held on Tuesday, November 4<sup>th</sup>, 2025. ## Water Conservation Notice

This past winter did not deliver the snowpack we had hoped for, and as a result, the City's pressurized irrigation (PI) system is already nearing capacity—well before the hottest weeks of the year.

Conservation efforts in 2021 and 2022 were highly effective, but water use increased by 20% in 2024 following the end of the drought. To avoid exceeding system capacity, the City is asking all residents to use their sprinkler systems wisely and avoid overwatering.

Recently installed water meters are a valuable tool for monitoring usage. If you haven't yet accessed your water use portal, visit <https://www.highlandpimeters.com> to sign up for an account.

A 20% reduction in use is the goal. Achieving this will help the PI system operate more efficiently, maintain proper pressure, and preserve water in reservoirs for later in the season.

If you notice brown spots or dry areas in your yard, try cleaning your sprinkler filter or spot-watering those areas instead of running a full sprinkler cycle.

Thank you for doing your part to conserve water!

## Firework Restrictions

For the month of July, state law allows fireworks to be shot from July 2<sup>nd</sup> to July 5<sup>th</sup> and July 22<sup>nd</sup> to July 25<sup>th</sup> from 11:00 a.m. - 11:00 p.m. except on July 4<sup>th</sup> and July 24<sup>th</sup> where hours extend to midnight.

Due to fire danger, fireworks are prohibited in certain areas of Highland including many subdivisions.

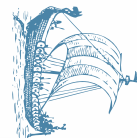

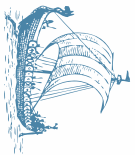

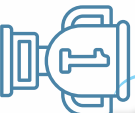

# Lead and Copper Rule

CONSUMER AND PUBLIC NOTIFICATION



## SERVICE LINE INVENTORY AND SAMPLING

Highland City Public Works has completed an initial lead service line inventory. This inventory includes information on the service line material that connects water mains to buildings/houses. This inventory can be accessed through our public works office. Thirty lead/copper samples were collected during 2024.

Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Highland City is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. **You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing.** You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. If your home was built before 1990, before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. Highland City found zero lead service lines, zero galvanized lines that require replacement. Highland City also has zero unknown service lines that need to be determined.

# GROUNDDWATER

All drinking water provided to Highland City residents comes from groundwater, therefore, it is essential that we protect that vital water source. Groundwater can become contaminated by various activities such as the residential application of fertilizers and pesticides. When applying fertilizers and pesticides, make certain that your spreader is calibrated correctly to avoid applying too much product. Over watering can also cause excess water to move through the soil flushing fertilizer away from the root zone and into the ground water.

**Please help us protect our precious drinking water resources by: Implement Best Management Practices for pollution prevention and for household hazardous waste by following the fact sheets found at Utah DDW - Household Pollution Prevention (pdf). Use pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations and Implement Best Management Practices following the fact sheets found at Utah DDW - Fertilizer Pollution Prevention (pdf) and Utah DDW - Pesticide Pollution Prevention (pdf)**

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791). The Drinking Water Source Protection Plan for Highland City is available for your review. It contains information about source protection zones, potential contamination sources and management strategies to protect our drinking water. Our water sources have been determined to be from ground water, and have been determined to have a low level of susceptibility from potential contamination. We have also developed management strategies to further protect our sources from contamination. Please contact us if you have questions or concerns about our source protection plan.

We encourage our customers to take an active interest in their water. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. Please feel free to attend our council meetings to learn more about our water utility. Those meetings are held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 7:00 pm at the Highland City Office.

It's easy to get in the habit of just setting the sprinkler clock and walking away, not thinking about it for the remainder of the summer. Residents are encouraged to actively monitor watering and maybe cut out a watering day here or there throughout the summer season as weather and conditions permit. **Allowing the soil to dry out can actually be beneficial in preventing fungus that infects many yards.**

An excellent resource to help determine how often to water is the Utah Division of Water's Weekly Watering Guide published at [conservewater.utah.gov](http://conservewater.utah.gov) and on Facebook @conserveutahwater. You can also find other resources such as how to do your own water check on your sprinkler system, rebate programs for taking water conservation steps, waterwise landscaping, and how to "flip your strip" from grass to a water-wise strip.

Customer SERVICE

Highland City public works has the best interest of the community at heart and works continually, night or day, to ensure the highest quality water is provided to every tap. Water is the most precious resource to our community's current wellbeing and our bright future. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We make every available effort to continually improve the water delivery process and protect our water resources.

In addition to the constituents listed in the table to the above, we also test for over 65 others.

NONE WERE DETECTED

Our drinking water distribution system has many connections. Concerns for adverse effects to the system are minimal when those connections are properly installed and maintained. The supply and the quality of drinking water may be affected if connections are made to the system that are unapproved or improperly installed; otherwise referred to as a cross connection. Cross connections can allow contaminated water or chemicals to intersperse into the drinking water supply if the connection is not properly protected. Improper connections not only compromise the drinking water quality but can also affect you and your family's health.

What can be done by you, our customer, to alleviate this problem? Do not make or allow improper or unapproved connections at your homes. Did you know that a garden hose in a watering trough or pool is a cross connection and so is a swimming pool or spa with an autofill line. DETERMINATION OF CONTAMINANT

Levels

The state and federal government imposes the highest level of concern for the quality of drinking water, and has set the MCLs at very strict levels. To illustrate the possible health effects, a person would have to drink over 2 quarts of water with the contaminant at the MCL level every day of their life to have a 0.000001% chance of having the described health effect. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these impurities do not necessarily pose a health risk. Should there be a concern for your safety, we will contact you and let you know the appropriate action to take to continue to have safe drinking water.
