- **City Council Vacancy Filled:** Highland City Council has appointed Ron Campbell to fulfill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mayor-Elect Brittney B. Bills. He will serve on the City Council through 2027.
- **Renamed Park:** Canterbury South Park will be renamed to Charlie Greenland Park. A single monument will be placed in the park memorializing Charlie Greenland and an opening event will be held.

Highland City General Plan: Draft & Public Hearing

The General Plan is the official roadmap for our community. It provides the policy basis for the City Council to guide all private and public physical development in Highland. Your input is vital as we finalize this vision for our future! The City Council is scheduled to review and approve the plan on:

Trailhead Construction

The Ridges at Alpine is a recently approved subdivision in Draper, just north of the Angels Gate trailhead near Hogs Hollow.

As construction begins, Highland City has been working with the property owner to allow access across the area to provide continued access to the trails. Trail users should use caution, as heavy machinery will likely be in the area and may have difficulty seeing hikers and bicyclists.

A bridge will be installed over the gas line easement, which will provide access across the property for trail users and is expected to be completed this spring. Construction on the site is likely to last at least a year.

Christmas Tree Disposal Service - Easy & Eco Friendly

The holiday season is a time for celebration and joy, but once the festivities are over, it's time to think about taking down the tree. If you're looking for a hassle-free and environmentally-friendly way to dispose of your Christmas tree, we've got you covered.

You can drop off your live Christmas tree for disposal from December 27th to January 9th in the provided bins in the field across from the Police Station. It's a simple and convenient way to properly dispose of your tree without worrying about curbside collection.

When: December 27th — January 9th

Where: Field across from the Police Station

Hours: Any time of day

Before you bring your tree, please remember to remove all ornaments, tinsel, lights, and tree stands. This ensures the tree is ready for recycling and properly processed. Disposing of your Christmas tree in a responsible way helps keep our community clean and supports eco-friendly recycling efforts. Once collected, the trees will be turned into mulch and compost, keeping waste out of landfills.

Street Parking and Plowing

Street plowing priority is based on the road classification and usage. Those streets identified as arterial or collector roads and those deemed to be in the minimum network needed to provide basic transportation for public safety such as near schools or steep grades, will receive priority. These streets will be plowed 24 hours per day, 7 days a week when weather conditions warrant.

When storm conditions have moderated, lower priority roads and roads interior to subdivisions, including cul-de-sacs will be plowed. It may take anywhere from 3 to 5 days after the storm before crews clear all of these areas.

Street parking is prohibited from December 1st to March 31st between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. and any time snow is present to allow access to the plows for snow removal. The Police Department may issue parking citations or even have vehicles towed that are parked on the street during or shortly after a snowstorm.
