MAYOR'S CORNER

The Town Center south of SR-92 has had commercial property sitting dormant for the last 10 years. One of the main obstacles to new businesses coming to Highland has been exaction fees. Exaction fees have been \$2.59/sf in the Town Center to cover expenses incurred by the City for roads and other infrastructure. Over the years new businesses have been deterred due to this high cost causing slow development. The City Council recently approved a reduction of the exaction fee to \$1.50/sf. This is an incentive to new businesses and also covers the cost for the City to develop the remaining infrastructure. We have already seen more interest by developers to come to the Town Center. We want the Town Center to develop and are working to attract businesses that serve the residents needs in Highland.

Additionally, the Economic Development Committee is functioning to evaluate further solutions to incentivize businesses coming to Highland City. The Committee is evaluating the Town Center as well as the Commercial Zone south of Lone Peak High School and west of 4800 W. Also, the Toscana Condominium development is progressing with new residents bringing more people to the Town

Center. During summer months, the Town Center Plaza (water park) is an attraction for local residents as well as residents from other areas that come to enjoy the park. All of these activities help to build our local businesses and encourage others to come to Highland to do business.

With large businesses on each end of the City it may seem convenient to go out of Highland City to shop. When you have a need and our businesses carry your item, please support our local businesses. They are a great asset to our community and serve in providing needed items to the community as well as an important and strong tax base for the City. Highland is known for and will continue to have the large lot, open space, and rural feel of a bedroom community. With the smaller commercial base it is important we work together to support our Town Center.

A Look at I-15 CORE in 2011

In just a year, the I-15 Corridor Expansion (I-15 CORE) has gone from concept designs to full-scale construction on all 24 miles of the project. Since April 2010, crews have placed more than 4 million tons of fill, laid 20 miles of drainage pipe, placed 300,000 square yards of concrete roadway and put in 1.5 million hours of work.

This year will be even busier, with work focusing on three main areas:

Concrete Paving - As more concrete roadway is constructed, traffic will be moved to the newly built lanes, resulting in major traffic shifts on I-15.

Interchange Work - All 10 interchanges will be under construction in 2011, with closures affecting the Orem 1600 North, 800 North and Center Street interchanges, as well as American Fork 500 East and Provo Center Street and ramps at the U.S. 6/Spanish Fork Main Street interchange.

Bridge Construction - Provo River Constructors plan to complete three bridge moves in Pleasant Grove, Lindon and Provo and continue work on more than 50 other bridges throughout the project.

February Efforts will Include Reconstructing Arterial, Building Bridges

Work on the Timpanogos Highway (S.R. 92) reconstruction project will continue through the month of February, although most of the major work being done during the month will be taking place within Lehi city boundaries.

With traffic in Lehi now switched over from the old S.R. 92 roadway to the newly constructed Commuter Lanes, work will be directed at demolishing the old roadway and beginning the task of reconstructing the new, five-lane Timpanogos Highway arterial. The project team will focus on the roadway around Triumph Blvd. and Morning Glory Road – two roads that are currently closed – in order to restore those important accesses to the Traverse Mountain area as quickly as possible.

Work that you will see as you drive on Timpanogos Highway between I-15 and Highland will include:

- Excavation and construction of a new bridge about halfway between Triumph Blvd. and Morning Glory Road;
- New walls being built near I.M. Flash, Lehi Center Street and in the Dry Creek area;
- Roto-milling and obliterating pavement from the old S.R.

92 roadway;

- Storm drains being installed from Dry Creek to the frontage road;
- Construction of a temporary “shoe-fly” road at Lehi Center Street that will allow traffic to continue to flow between Center Street and Timpanogos Highway while a pedestrian tunnel and a large storm drain are being installed there;
- Additional elements of the S.R. 92 arterial and Commuter Lanes, as weather allows;
- And utility relocations taking place between the frontage road and Ashton Blvd. in the Thanksgiving Point area, as crews prepare to begin work on the new Diverging Diamond Interchange (DDI) configuration that will be constructed at the Highland/Alpine interchange beginning in the spring.

“Even with cold winter weather, there is a lot of work that can be completed on the project during the month of February,” said Access Utah County Project Manager Dan Avila. “Our crews will be making every effort to get as much done as the weather will allow so we can make exciting innovations like the Commuter Lanes and the new DDI available to the motoring public as quickly as possible.”

When using heaters inside a home, tent, etc. make sure that they are designed for closed spaces. Heaters that burn fuel are usually not designed to be used inside and produce Carbon Monoxide, a deadly gas. Make sure that your smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors are working with fresh batteries installed.

Lastly if you live near a fire hydrant make sure that the snow is removed with at least a 3' clear radius around it. During a fire, time is of the essence. Removing the snow makes it faster to locate and attach fire hoses to take care of your emergency.
