Rabies Clinic Saturday, February 7

Dogs Need to be Vaccinated and Licensed

The Annual Rabies Clinic will be held **Saturday, February 7, 2004** from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., at the **Highland City Public Works Building, 4066 West 11000 North.** All dogs need to be vaccinated and licensed.



The rabies shot is \$7. The following is the annual license fee schedule: Spayed and Neutered: One Year License \$5, Two Year License \$8; Unaltered: One Year License \$35, Two Year License \$45. Proof of rabies shots must be shown when applying for a license.

The **Mobile Spay & Neuter Clinic** will once again be visiting our area on **February 5, 2004** for one day only. Location: Parking Lot at Mouth of American Fork Canyon on SR92. **Intake is from 8:00 a.m. until full.** Arrive early! Space is limited. Do not feed your pet late the night before, or the morning of the surgery. Water is OK. All cats must be brought in a carrier with identification. Vaccinations

will also be available to surgery patients only. Animals must be between the ages of 7 weeks and 6 years. Prices are as follows: Female Dog \$40, Male Dog \$30, Female Cat \$25, Male Cat \$15, Dogs over 80 lbs are \$10 extra. For any questions call 1-866-738-7349.
