Dog Licenses Required

Fortunately, most persons who have pets are responsible pet owners. As such they perform the necessary tasks, chores and duties associated with pet ownership. In an urban setting responsible pet ownership becomes more important than in an agrarian setting. The primary responsibility of government concerning pet ownership involves health safety for the community at large. Although we mainly see our pets as loveable companions they can easily be carriers of disease.

Due to the responsibility of promoting the public health and protecting the community from health hazards, local governments pass and enforce certain ordinances. One primary way to address health issues in communities is requiring the licensing of dogs. This assures the community that the animal has been vaccinated against certain diseases, specifically rabies. Yes, even in today's society, rabies is still very much a health hazard. In an attempt to assure that dogs within our communities have been vaccinated against rabies proof of

the vaccination is required for licensing. Subsequently yearly licensing of dogs is required by city ordinance. Adhering to the ordinance is the best protection the community has against infecting our citizens with this extreme disease.

By assuring that your dog is currently and properly licensed you assist us in protecting the community from this disease. Statistics show that it is common for only approximately 20% of dogs in a community are properly licensed. Please help us protect you by licensing your dog. Licenses can be purchased at the Lone Peak Police Station or directly from our Animal Control Officer. The license is good for one year from date of purchase and is good throughout Utah County. Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required. The fee for a license is \$15 for an altered dog and \$35 for a dog which has not been spayed or neutered.

Construction on SR-92

The first full construction season on UDOT's SR-92 reconstruction project swings fully into gear this month, with work taking place all along the corridor. During the 2010 construction season you'll see two different approaches to the project being taken at different locations. From Highland Blvd. to just east of Town Center Blvd. SR-92 is being widened to a five-lane facility – two lanes in each direction, with a center median. In order to accomplish this all traffic has been switched to the south side of the road from 6400 West to Town Center while construction takes place on the north side of the road. Later in the summer the traffic will be switched to the newly com-

pleted north side while work takes place on the south side. By the end of the summer this section of the SR-92 project should be complete.

To the west of Highland Blvd. the focus of the project this season will be on the construction of the new commuter lanes (lanes that will pass over – or under – intersections, allowing motorists to drive directly to and from I-15 without stopping) on either side of the existing SR-92 corridor. That switch, should happen next spring.

The SR-92 reconstruction project is part of Access Utah County, a UDOT program designed to improve mobility in northern Utah County. It is scheduled for completion in Fall 2011. For more information on the project please go to www.udot.utah.gov/sr92.
