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Pressurized Irrigation Q & A

With spring upon us, this means that the watering season is too. The pressurized irrigation system is now available for use. Below are some frequently asked questions to guide residents through the warm summer months and watering their landscaping.

Frequently Asked Questions

- **When is the pressurized irrigation system turned on / off every year?**

ON - Highland City tries to have the irrigation system pressurized by April 15. This is a long process and in order to achieve our goal of having the system fully operable some areas throughout the City may have water as soon as April 1. However, please be patient as it may take a few extra days before the entire system is fully pressurized due to maintenance on lines that were damaged during the winter months.

OFF - Residents can expect the system to be shut off on or around October 15.

- **Does my sprinkler system require a filter?**

Yes. The majority of the pressurized irrigation water comes from surface water and is not filtered. We recommend that residents contact their local sprinkler supply store for their recommendation on a filter.

- **What size of filter should I get for my sprinkler system?**

The filter size depends on each home owner's service size.

- **How do I find out the pressure for my sprinkler system?**

Please visit www.highlandcity.org to view a list of pressures by subdivision. If your subdivision is not listed, please call Highland City Public Works at 801.772.4510 or send an email to publicworks@highlandcity.org to place a service request. We will continue to update this list on the City website throughout the summer.

- **What if my pressure drops?**

If water pressure drops off please check your filter before calling the City. It is the home owner's responsibility to perform regular maintenance on their filters.

- **How often should I clean my filter to avoid losing pressure?**

We recommend checking your filter for debris on a regular basis and cleaning it as needed.

- **How do I find my filter?**

Please visit www.highlandcity.org for steps on finding and cleaning your filter.

- **Are there health concerns if I drink the pressurized irrigation water?**

The pressurized irrigation water is an untreated water source and is considered non-potable. Precautions should be taken not to allow children to drink the water.

Also, please note that any cross connection between the pressurized irrigation and drinking water systems are illegal and can cause health issues for the City. If you feel you have one of these connections please take the necessary steps to disconnect from the drinking water system. If you are unsure if you have one of these connections or if you would like to request assistance when disconnecting please contact Public Works at the number listed below.

Utah Lake Festival Promotes Outdoor Fun and Stewardship

Highlights Include Hawaiian Outrigger Canoe Demonstrations, Free Food, Kids Activities, and a Nature Walking Tour!

The fifth annual Utah Lake Festival will be held Saturday, June 6, 2009, from 10 am to 2 pm, at Utah Lake State Park. The purpose of the Festival is to offer Wasatch Front residents a chance to get outside and enjoy Utah Lake, experience its many recreational opportunities and offerings, and learn about the lake's ecosystem, native species and the importance of stewardship.

The Festival, which is free, will offer an array of activities for everyone, including the opportunity to make and wear fish hats, free fishing, canoeing demonstrations, a sail boat regatta, games and activities for kids, music and boat tours. There will also be free hot dogs, snow cones, apples and water for Festival attendees. Park entrance is free during the Festival.

The June Sucker Recovery Implementation Program (JSRIP), a program designed to recover the endangered June sucker fish that lives only in Utah Lake, the Utah Lake Commission, a group comprised of local government officials and state agency leaders, the Utah Lake State Park and multiple municipalities surrounding Utah Lake are working together to put on this year's Utah Lake Festival.

Historically, Utah Lake was used recreationally much more than it is today. More than 20 resorts once dotted the shoreline. Showboats, with live music and dancing, took people out for excursions to Bird Island, airplanes landed on sandy beaches to offer people rides, and for decades boat races were held as a Memorial Day mainstay in the Provo Harbor.

Although there are countless stories to be told about Utah Lake's past, the Lake has much to offer today. Whether you visit for adventure or relaxation, this massive freshwater lake and its miles of shoreline are sure to please everyone.



In cooperation with Utah State Parks, the Library now has a **day use pass** for checkout. It may be checked out for one week, available on a first-come, first serve basis, may not be reserved, and has a few additional limitations. Check with the library staff for more information. This program, Reach Out and Connect Kids in Nature, is part of a nationwide Children in Nature effort, based on the book *Last Child in Woods: Saving Our Children from nature Deficit Disorder* by Richard Louv (155.418 Lou). For the past year various Boy Scouts in the Highland area have been placing storm drain stickers near the storm drains in Highland City residential areas. The stickers remind residents not to dump harmful chemicals into the drains. Substances that should not be dumped would include paint, motor oil, diapers, fertilizers, trash, pet waste, etc. Dumping these can cause harm to wildlife and recreational users of our waterways and lakes. The drains were built to carry water, so water should be the only thing dumped. The dumping of chemicals and other debris is illegal and may result in a fine. One guideline to follow is, "If you wouldn't drink it, don't dump it!"
