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AN UPDATE ON AUTOMATED METER READERS

Dear Resident,

As you may be aware, Highland City has completed the installation of the Automated Meter Readers (AMR) for the culinary water system. Highland City has already begun using the AMR for a monthly culinary water reading, and we have seen great success. Previously your water meter was read on a quarterly basis, with the AMR's the Public Works Department is now able to read your water meter on a monthly basis.

The new AMR's give us the ability to detect a problem such as a leak or see high water usage earlier, rather than waiting the three or four months it took with the quarterly hand readings. The City has already been able to inform residents of possible leaks or problems in their system without having to wait months in between readings.

The new system also means the meter reader will no longer need to enter the property to read the meters; instead, the readings are taken while the meter reader drives down the street. The AMR's transmit the water usage through radio frequencies to a computer in the service vehicle. This new system allows for a complete water meter reading of the City within three to six hours with one staff member. Previously it took approximately two weeks with four to six staff members. This translates into a cost savings for manpower, fuel, and equipment wear. This also means that there is more time for staff to attend to other maintenance issues.

The new meters will not interfere with any electronic devices and for security purposes

only our equipment is able to read the signal and no personal data is transmitted through the signal.

We have also replaced approximately 1,000 older meters. These meters had reached the end of their service life and would have needed retrofitting to make the AMR's work; therefore, these meters were replaced and the AMR was installed. The installation of the AMR and the new meters has not changed the flow or pressure to your home. The AMR is not placed in the flow of the water and does not impede that flow, and any meters that were replaced match the same size you had previously.

Utah Lake Master Planning Public Information Sessions To Be Held

The Utah Lake Commission, a group comprised of local government officials and state agency leaders, is holding two public information sessions as part of their Utah Lake master planning process, entitled Awake Utah Lake. The purpose of the sessions is to review with the public the visioning statement that has been drafted, to discuss identified

opportunities and constraints, and to obtain input.

The information sessions, which are the same, will be held from 7 to 9 pm on Wednesday, July 30 at the Utah County Health & Justice Building, 151 S. University Ave, Room 1600, Provo, Utah, and from 7 to 9 pm on Thursday, July 31 at the Lehi Senior Citizens Center, 123 N. Center Street, Lehi, Utah.

The purpose of Awake Utah Lake is to create a vision and

management plan for Utah Lake that will guide the Utah Lake Commission and its member agencies in future decisions affecting the lake.

Garbage Can Tips to Help Clean up the Neighborhood

To ensure consistent service your trash container must be out to the street no later than 7:00 am. Please make sure that trash is bagged and that all bags are tied closed. This ensures that all of your trash will be emptied into the garbage truck and that during high winds trash will stay in your trash can.

We also recommend that all yard waste be bagged as it has a tendency to stick in the bottom of the containers.

When moving, you must contact Highland City for a final water meter reading to have your account terminated. Highland City requests 48 hours notice. The garbage toters MUST stay at the residence; they are property of Allied Waste.

MOVE INS

Anyone moving into the city, or from one home to another, MUST have a utilities agreement on file with Highland City in order to receive services.

There is a \$25 account set-up fee that must be paid along with the agreement. Failure to file the agreement and pay the setup fee may result in services being shut off. If shut off takes place, there are reconnect fees in addition to the setup fees.

CELEBRATING IN SAFETY - Fire Chief Craig Carlisle

Summer celebrations are fast approaching when fun and fireworks are a main event. With the July holidays we ask you to keep in mind safety when using fireworks. Even with the heavy precipitation this year, we are still at risk for unintentional fire situations. We ask that parents talk to their children regarding the unsupervised use of matches and fireworks.

There have been problems with illegal fireworks such as bottle rockets, ro-

man candles, and fire crackers. Keep in mind if you have to go out of state to purchase these kind of fireworks, they are illegal in Utah. The only fireworks authorized in the State of Utah are those that can be purchased from a licensed dealer within this state. Fireworks that use combustible or explosive material and raise more than 15 feet are illegal. A chaser, whistler, or any other device that travels more than 10 feet laterally on a smooth surface, or exceeds 15 feet in

height when discharged is also classified as illegal in the state of Utah.

The sale or use of illegal fireworks is a Class B Misdemeanor. Fireworks may be discharged only 3 days before, on the day of, and 3 days following July 4th, July 24th, January 1st, and the Chinese New Year. Individuals using illegal fireworks that initiate a response from the Fire Department will be billed for that response and a citation will be issued.
