MAYOR'S CORNER

Sunday closure for all businesses in Highland City has been an issue for many years. The current ordinance restricts businesses from being open on Sunday. In 2006 the city conducted a survey by an outside consultant that asked residents if businesses should be closed. On a scale of 1.0-5.0 the score was 4.1 in favor of keeping businesses closed on Sunday. This has been interpreted as a strong mandate from residents that their wish is to have Sunday closure. Survey results were included in the Highland City General Plan in 2008. It has been suggested that if we ever change this to allow Sunday opening, it should be done through another survey or a resident vote; not just a vote of the City Council. I personally believe this is an important enough issue in the city that residents should have a vote on the issue. If the mandate from the residents has changed they need to make it known in a vote.

There have been several opinions expressed that it is time to change the ordinance and allow businesses to be open on Sunday. There are opinions on both sides of the argument. One argument is businesses should be open on Sunday and allow shoppers to choose to shop or not shop. It is also believed that businesses have chosen not to locate in Highland because of the Sunday closing ordinance. We have been told by some businesses and potential developers that not being open on Sunday is a negative for the business environment. The other argument is that we should be closed on Sunday because that is who we are as a city. Residents have voiced the desire to accept less sales tax revenue from businesses and use residential property taxes to support city services. Both arguments have merit and supporters. The question is, "what is the will of the residents now and has it changed from 2008?"

The City Council has requested that Sunday closure be put on an upcoming City Council agenda. This is planned for the Council meeting on April 17. The requirement for Sunday closing appears in two places in our ordinances. One place is

located in our planning code which requires Sunday closing only in one commercial district. Our municipal code requires Sunday closing in all zoning districts, with the exception of gas stations and some private clubs. The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on March 27, 2012 to consider the change in the one zoning district. This change, along with the overall change to the municipal code will then be considered by the City Council on April 17, 2012. Please watch the City Calendar and Agenda on the city website in case the dates change. If you have an interest in this issue please be involved by attending the meeting or contacting your City Council.

This has always been a critical issue for Highland residents. It is important that you email or personally contact City Council members who will be making the decision and voice your opinion. Your opinion, one way or the other is important to us. Should we allow businesses to be open on Sunday and potentially attract more business or remain closed and potentially risk losing business? Do you want to support city services with more sales tax revenue from businesses or use residential property tax as the major source of revenue? Arbor Day Activities & Annual Tree Sale

April 28: Arbor Day Tree Planting & Landscaping Projects - Come help the Tree Commission plant trees on Knight Avenue (behind Lone Peak High School) on Saturday, April 28th at 8:00 a.m. Please bring a shovel if you can. We will return to this location to finish up the landscaping project on Saturday, May 5th at 8:00 a.m. Please bring a wheelbarrow, shovel, and a rake to help out. We will be placing river rock and weed fabric in the planter areas. Both of these projects will be coordinated by scouts who are doing this as their Eagle Projects. Please come support them by bringing your church group, family, friends, and neighbors!

April 28 & May 5: Arbor Day Tree Sale - The annual Tree Sale will be held from 8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. in front of the Highland Water Building on 11000 North (next to Wendy's). April 28th is for Highland Residents only. You will need to bring proof of residency with you (ID, Utility Bill, etc.). We will only accept checks and cash. All trees are sold AS IS, with a maximum of 8 trees per resident. We will not hold trees or take special orders. Pressurized Irrigation

The pressurized irrigation system will be back on and ready for use the week of **April 15**. Please be patient while the City brings up the system. It usually takes a week to ten days to bring online. Make sure your stop and waste valves are **shut off** while the system is being loaded. Individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

Burn Permits

This year the Utah County Fire Marshal has set the date for the burn window from April 1st to April 30th. Any resident inside the county is allowed to burn if they have a burn permit if it is a "burn day". You can obtain a burn permit at City Hall (Monday - Thursday, 7:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.) for no charge. With your permit you will also receive a list of rules that must be followed. Each day before you burn you must also call the burn hotline at 801-374-BURN to find out if the air quality is good enough to burn. The Lone Peak Fire District appreciates and supports your efforts to burn safely and comply with the Utah County burn permit rules.

Shakeout - Earthquake Drill

On Tuesday **April 17th at 10:15 a.m.** Highland City along with the entire state of Utah will experience a 7.0 magnitude [earthquake drill](#). Will you be ready for the next one? Practice at home or work and learn to be prepared. Practice **DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON** for at least **one minute**. If you find yourself inside during the drill find a sturdy piece of furniture to crouch under or interior wall to kneel down by and cover your head. If you are outside get away from buildings or power lines that may fall on you and get low to the ground to prevent yourself from falling too.

What TO bring:


- Medications

- Electronics

What NOT to bring:

- Containers over 5 gallons in size
- Ammunition / explosives
- Compressed gas or propane tanks
- Asbestos materials
- PCB- related materials
- Medical / biological waste
- Radioactive waste
- Fire extinguishers
- Business / commercial / construction waste

Please do not mix wastes. Bring in original containers if possible. Waste must be capped or sealed.

North Utah County Library Cooperative: Highland City Library will become a member of the North Utah County Library Cooperative (NUCLC) April 1, 2012! The cooperative includes American Fork, Pleasant Grove, Lehi and Eagle Mountain libraries. Because Highland City Library is much smaller and has fewer resources than our neighboring libraries, Highland Library patrons will be required to pay \$40 to use one of the NUCLC libraries. Highland Library cards are still free to Highland residents.

When using NUCLC libraries, remember: All patrons must have a valid library card from their 'home library' and should be in good standing at that library; Your library card must be presented at the time of borrowing an item; The card entitles the patron to borrow items only - participating in programs is excluded in the agreement; All policies and procedures of the lending library are valid, and the patron must abide by said policies and will be responsible for any incurred charges; All items must be returned to the lending library according to the date due.

Requests (Holds) can only be placed at your 'home' library (Highland). Any requests made to another library will not be honored. The intent of this policy is to allow the card holders of each of the libraries first access to the materials at that library.
