## MAYOR'S CORNER

Sometime ago I wrote an article on civility. This word, I find, has different definitions depending on each individual. Recently, a resident discussed with me a problem he was having in his neighborhood regarding a problem with a dog. The dog barked, neighbors complained, and animal control visited. We have had other complaints where the dog owner claimed it was not their dog barking, but residents did not verify the location of the barking dog; they just registered a complaint. On another occasion, a resident related that residents complained because they had their garbage can on the street longer than 24 hours. And finally, another resident constructed a fence on property they did not own, and were surprised that a complaint was registered against them.

I find these cases very interesting and important for those who complain and those who have a complaint registered against them. We hear much today about freedom and "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." How do two people have liberty and happiness when their thoughts and actions oppose each other? This is where I believe civility needs to become part of the discussion. As neighbors we should be good civil citizens. If we own dogs, we should take care of them so they do not infringe on neighbors, we should return our trash cans to our

property promptly; and we should not put up fences on property that does not belong to us. Sounds simple! However, we do not all see things the same way. A little civil tolerance goes a long way in these situations. For example, did the neighbor just forget the garbage can and need a friendly reminder? Do we approach the neighbor and talk to them about barking dogs or fences before we complain? Many times a friendly discussion can solve potential problems before they become problems. If a discussion does not solve the problem, then action can be taken. Cities have ordinances to ensure all residents can enjoy freedom. When our choices and behaviors affect others outside our own property then we are taking away the same freedoms we desire from others. Free dialog, respect, civility and tolerance can resolve many problems before that becomes a big issue. I believe civility works.

- Creating funds to begin a "Shop Highland" an economic development program.
- Reducing the number of paid employees in the Library by half

**Tree Tip of the Month** – Tree trunks grow in the air and tree roots grow in the ground. Small, uncovered tree roots can die in a few hours on a hot day so when you are planting a new tree, take care to keep the small roots moist and covered. Also keep mulch and soil away from the trunks of new and established trees because the microbes can rot (decompose) the wood and kill the tree.
