MAYOR'S CORNER

Two years ago I wrote an article about Highland Glen Park. For several years, the park was run down and in disrepair. Through the hard work of our public works department, volunteers, and donations, this park is now very inviting, open, and available for use. The pavilion is excellent for group functions and can be reserved at the City offices. The lake is great for fishing. The trails are open and great for jogging or just a walk. Boy Scout Eagle Projects have improved the park and are continuing to do so. Take a visit to the park and enjoy the amenities.

Other parks are also available to citizens. One that is just being developed is Beacon Hills Park. This park has been in the design phase for several years. This year the Council approved funding to complete phase one of the development of the park. Extensive infrastructure and shaping is required in phase one and will begin soon. This park will benefit mostly local neighborhoods in the Beacon Hills area, but will also be used for soccer teams in the City, as well as residents using the pavilion, etc. It will add much to our park needs. Other neighborhood parks provide great open space and soccer for the kids. We are fortunate to have open park space.

Three parks that you may not be aware of

are still undeveloped. Mountain Ridge Park west of Mt. Ridge Jr. High is a 17 acre park we hope to develop into four baseball fields with parking. It is an excellent location and will add much to our needed baseball fields. Spring Creek Park is located near 10000N. and 6200W and is 11 acres for future development. Dry Creek Park is located in Dry Creek east of Smiths and north of the Highland Hollow subdivision in the bottom of Dry Creek. This park has no specific plans, but is large enough for baseball, pavilion, etc.

Parks are an integral part of our City open space. They are meant to enjoy. We hope you enjoy them with your families. We look forward to developing these parks as funding becomes available. This may take a few years, but we have an excellent start and master plan.

Did you Know?

- Highland City would like to pursue a green waste recycling program. We estimate that we could provide a green waste collection program that would cost slightly more than the recycle can billing or just over \$5 per month. This assumes Allied/Republic Services would provide the carts, provide every other week service, and there would be at least a 20% participation level. The billing is for 8 months of the year with plans to start next year. There is a green waste survey form on the Utilities page at www.highlandcity.org for those interested in pursuing this option.

Pressurized Irrigation

Due to the lack of snow pack and the low volume of water in the American Fork River, Highland City is currently supplementing its pressurized irrigation system with additional sources of water from the Central Utah Project.

Unfortunately this has caused an increase of sediment in the pressurized irrigation system which is affecting the city's filters as well as resident's filters. We anticipate this to be an ongoing issue throughout the rest of this watering season.

If you are experiencing low pressure at your home check and clean your filter and that should resolve the issue. Your filter will need to be cleaned often. Refer to the Highland City Pressurized Irrigation Instructions on Cleaning Filter on the Public Works page at www.highlandcity.org for assistance. If you continue to have issues after cleaning your filter, please call the Public Works Department at (801) 772-4523 or submit a request on-line using the Report a Concern feature at www.highlandcity.org

We are currently in a drought year with limited water. Highland City is encouraging all residents to conserve water wherever possible to avoid any mandatory watering restrictions in the future. PUBLIC HEARING - GENERAL PLAN LAND USE

At 7:00 p.m. on July 17, 2012, the City Council will hold a public hearing on a request to change the General Plan Land Use Map from low density residential to mixed use at the northwest, southeast, and southwest corners of 6000 West and SR 92. The following is background information:

- This request does not change the existing R-1-40 zoning of the property however it would allow property owners additional options to develop the property.
- The actual uses will be determined if and when the property is rezoned which requires additional public hearings and citizen involvement.
- The compatibility of future development with the adjacent residential neighborhood is a high priority and will also be addressed during the rezoning process.
- This request is part of an ongoing effort by the City Council and the Economic Development Committee to diversify the revenue collected by the city to meet current and future needs.

The two Landscape Management interns from BYU started working for the city in June in the Parks Department as seasonal hires. Meredith Perkins, Urban & Community Forestry Coordinator for the Utah Forestry Department, brought 18 Utah Forestry Managers to Highland for a tour and presentation on what we are doing to care for our urban forest. The Public Works Department along with the help of volunteers has transformed Highland Glen into a great place for family reunions and large family activities.

Highland is becoming a model city according to the Utah Urban Forestry people. The Parks and Trails Committee, the Open Space Committee, the Tree Commission and the hundreds of volunteers can feel good about the progress we've made toward making Highland a more beautiful and healthy city. We all appreciate the on going support from Mayor Ritchie and the City Council.

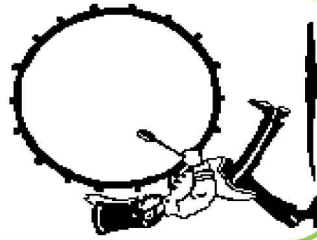
