MAYOR'S CORNER

I have had several people inquire about the City Truth-In-Taxation property tax increase. You may have noticed in your tax notice there is no tax increase for Highland. A referendum was filed with the City after the truth-in-taxation vote. This resulted in signatures gathered and the issue going to a vote of the citizens. So will you be voting on the tax increase in November? The answer is no, because of a timing problem created by the State Legislature.

The Legislature passed a law that allows a referendum to be filed on any law. Previously truth-in-taxation was exempt from referendums. The Legislature did not see the unintended consequence of the timing problem. Truth-in-Taxation hearings occur in August following a City Council or other municipality vote on a budget. A referendum, once filed, can take up to 50 days to process. The County needs the information by the end of August to get the item on the upcoming November ballot. Therefore, there is not enough time to accomplish the task. This results in the issue put on hold until the next election the following year which is another budget year. Members of the Legislature are well aware of the problem and will make a correction in the next legislative session in February.

Many have asked how this affects the City of Highland. The good news is, in the short run it does not cause major problems. We will not rebuild our badly deteriorating roads as

soon as we had planned. Long term the needed road rebuilds will cost more to fix. We will continue to do maintenance as much as we can with the dollars available. When the tax increase was proposed it all went to roads. We do not need a tax increase to sustain ongoing operations of the City. Some cities that require tax increases for daily operations now have to cut essential services to make up the difference. We are happy to report that is not the case in Highland.

We do need to build reserves over the next several years to rebuild some of our roads. The amounts required are large. I am confident that we will find solutions to solve the problem.

We wish you all a happy Thanksgiving. It is amazing how quickly this year is almost concluded. We have much to be thankful for in our City, State, and Nation. Thank you for making Highland City the greatest place to live, raise our families, and enjoy the association with good people.

Winter Snow Removal & Plowing

With winter approaching it is important for Highland residents and the City to work together during snow removal weather. During heavy snow storms it can take as much as 48 hours to clear all priority routes and through streets once the storm has subsided. Vehicles may not park on City Streets between 12:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m., December 1st through March 31st, and anytime snow is present. The Police Department may issue a parking citation. Parking on the street makes it difficult for plows to clear the streets. Tips to Save Money on Utilities

Did you know your winter water usage can affect your monthly sewer fee? Your yearly sewer fee is calculated by your winter water usage. On your monthly utility statement from Highland City, you can see your previous water reading, your current water reading, and the usage. The usage is in 1,000 gallon increments (i.e. 6 equals 6,000 gallons of water used). The average usage per household can range from 6,000 to 10,000 gallons per month. Please monitor your water usage on your monthly utility statement. If you see an unexplained increase in your water usage please check your appliances including toilets and water softeners to see if those are using excess water. If you are unable to locate the problem, please call the Public Works Department at (801) 772-4523 to receive assistance in locating possible outside water leaks. This simple tip can you save money!
